Outfield starters will include Roy Witzel in the left pasture, Larry Butler in right field, and John Scatlock playing in between.

The Aggies have played six games this season losing three of the contests by only one run. Nelson-Gay of Austin has defeated the home team twice, 6-1 and 1-0, while Texas University and the Aggies have split with one win each and a tie, and lost Thursday Madisonville-Edged-The Farmers, 3-2.

Texas slipped past the Maroons in left innings at Austin, 1-0, but on the home grounds the Aggies bounced back to beat the Longhorns, 6-3, and the second game finished 2-2 after five innings of play.
