

# Brazos A&M Club Schedules Barbecue 6:30 p.m. Monday

Athletes and coaches at A&M are getting set for a big party Monday night, and it is predicted to be one long remembered in this vicinity. It is the annual Brazos County A&M Club spring barbecue in their honor, and A&M men and friends of A&M will roll out the red carpet at 6:30 p. m. to entertain them at the new club house in Bryan.

This is the first time the spring barbecue honoring Aggie athletes will be held in the new club located west of Munnerly Village, and extensive plans have been made to show athletes and their coaches how much former students and friends of the club and school appreciate their efforts on the playing fields across the Southwest, according to W. N. "Flop" Colson, College Station insurance executive and president of the organization.

"We believe the 1950 party is going to top all others in attendance and enjoyment for everyone concerned," Colson said. "There'll be plenty of barbecue and soft drinks to mix with halfbacks, old grads, pole vaulters, young grads, tackle and waterboys. The best part of it is the fact that this is the chance for all of us to say 'thanks' to Athletic Director Barlow 'Bones' Irvin, his staff, and the kids who represent our college in athletics."

This year, as in previous years, club members and all A&M men and friends of the college in Brazos County will be "big brothers" to the athletes in the matter of tickets. For the \$2.00 duet, the purchaser obtains not only a ticket for himself, but provides one for and Aggie athlete. The athlete's name is written on that ticket combination, along with the name of the individual who provides the ticket for the athlete, Colson said.

"When you come out to the club house Monday evening," Colson said, "you'll get to shake hands around with the boys who are your guests and who are getting barbecue and fellowship because of you."

Tickets can be purchased singly for one dollar, and the club officers urged everyone who won't be present Monday night because of previous commitments to get a ticket for their "guest" regardless. There are more than 200 athletes in all sports at A&M, according to Barlow Irvin.

Tickets may be obtained from club officers, many members of the club, and others who are assisting in this spring party. Any one desiring delivery of tickets may call J. E. Grounds committee members are devoting this week to getting everything in shape for the outing, Colson said. "Other A&M men are hard at work on the planning, and it is important that our ticket committee have an accurate count of guests early so that we can make provisions for all expected to be present. ## TB Association Reveals X-Ray Survey Results

Mrs. A. A. Blumberg, executive secretary of the Brazos County Tuberculosis Association, announced the results of the recent X-ray survey of Brazos County at the regular meeting of the Tuberculosis Board Monday night.

A more complete summary is expected from the State Health Department according to Dr. D. E. Brown, director of the Health Unit.

A tentative summary is tuberculosis 134, suspicious tuberculosis 115, other chest abnormalities 124, and unsatisfactory prints (not readable) 51.

Individual reports should be received in the mail within the next few days. In many cases, a further examination by a private physician will be recommended.

The tuberculosis association will continue its program of paying for X-rays for those persons recommended by their doctor as being unable to pay for needed X-rays. The free TB Clinic at the Health Unit is prepared to serve those who are also referred to it by their private physicians.

In the business session of the board meeting, Mrs. Lee J. Rountree and Dr. J. H. Binney were elected to serve with officers of the board on the executive committee.

Mrs. A. O. Anderson, a teacher in the Carver School, was named to attend the Community Health Workshop at Texas University at Houston for six weeks this summer on a scholarship from the Rotary Club and the Tuberculosis Association.

hunting permits where there aren't any elk. Still, it's a good thing we might have elk there some day. We have some down in the Davis Mountains.

The commission is directed to recheck or modify its orders whenever necessary to prevent depletion of a species.

The agency also is instructed to take action to prevent waste, which is defined as a "supply of a species or sex sufficient that a seasonal harvest thereof will not prevent, or in the case of over-population, that will aid in the reestablishment of normal numbers of such species."

Court Appeal from orders of the decision is provided for by the law.
