### Board Makes Housing Plans For Next Year's Student Body

(Editor's Note: The following statement was released this morning by the Director of Information for the Texas A&M College System.)

Preparing for the return of freshmen to the main College campus in September, the Board of Directors of the A&M College of Texas today announced changes in the plan of operation of the College designed to improve student living conditions and strengthen the military program within its cadet system.

The action was taken in a special meeting of the Board, Thursday, at the Lamar Hotel in Houston.

The Board acted by unanimous vote after considering a report by its Student Life Committee. The Committee had made an exhaustive study of student life at the College, holding a number of meetings on the campus and interviewing former students, students, and administrative officers.

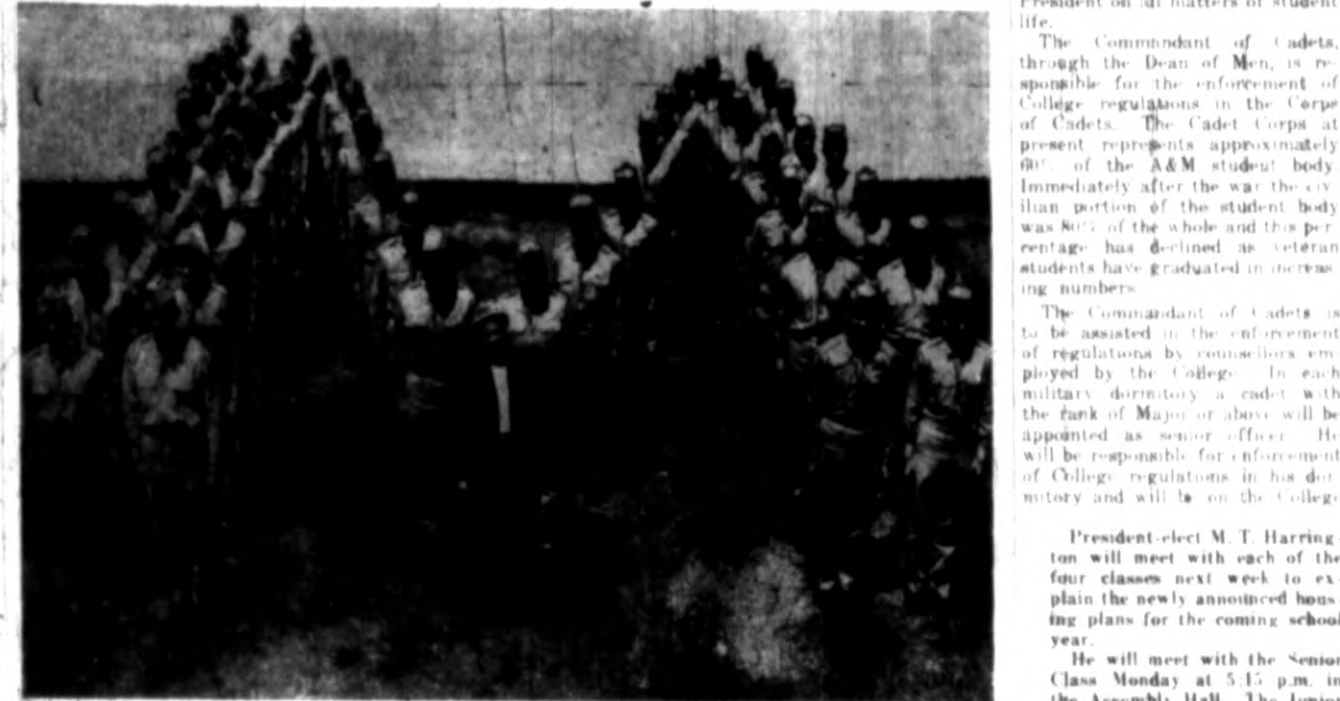
Principal changes ordered by the Board were in the housing of students and provisions for the enforcement of regulations in the dormitories occupied by members of the Corps of Cadets. They were designed primarily to control hazing, which has been a major problem of dormitory life at the College for many years, particularly when freshmen were housed on the main campus. For the past four years, as a result of the postwar overcrowding, freshmen have been housed in an Annex at the Bryan

**Arts and Sciences**  
**Biology:** Exhibits by the Pre-Med, Pre-Dent Society zoology students, taxonomy students and bacteriology students. Exhibits of optical equipment, bacteria of anthrax, tuberculosis and other diseases will be included. Location, Rooms 12, 23, 24, and 28 of the Science Hall.

**Chemistry:** Exhibits illustrating the art of happiness is to be found in service to others, and if his statement be true, then Mrs. Cashion should be supremely happy.

**Geography:** Displays showing types of map projections, distribution of crops, weather movements of the most recent hurricane on the Texas coast, a planisphere and plastic relief maps will be shown in Room 107 of the Chemistry Building.

**Journalism:** Exhibits illustrating work in news writing, news editing, advertising copy and layout, and typography will be open in Rooms 101, 106, and 107 of Bizzell Hall.

**Mathematics:** Offices on first floor of the Academic building will be open to visitors.

**Modern Languages:** Office on first floor of the Academic Building open to visitors. Spanish handwriting will also be shown.

**Physical Education:** Offices and facilities open to inspection.

**Physics:** Demonstrations of Atomic Energy and Nuclear Physics, Spectroscopy, Light, Seeding in the Dark, Photography, Arresting Motion Gyroscopes, and Believe or Not in the Physics Building.

**School of Agriculture**
