

ED Dept. Names Contest Winners

W. M. Stauts, Jimmy Curtis, L. M. Castor, and C. L. Pirtle were named winners in the various classes of the annual engineering drawing contest in a special award ceremony at the Annex this afternoon.

Making the presentation was Dr. H. W. Barlow, dean of engineering, who was assisted by the heads of the departments of the school of engineering.

Receives Drawing Instruments
Stauts, a mechanical engineering major from Marshall, was the winner in the contest division class A: working drawing made with instruments. He received a set of drawing instruments donated by the Federick Post Company as a prize.

In the same division, R. E. Evans of Houston, also a mechanical engineering major, placed second and industrial education major, T. L. Hurta of San Antonio was third. Evans received a Fugle pencil and pencil sharpener from the Exchange Store and Hurta was the recipient of a 6" pocket scale also donated by the Exchange Store.

In class B, Jimmy Curtis captured top honors with his solution of a practical descriptive geometry problem. Curtis, a chemical engineering major from Bryan, received a set of drawing instruments from the Eugene Dietzen Company.

Other class B winners and their prizes: B. N. Jones, aeronautical engineering from Brackenside, a

portable drafting table from Eugene Dietzen Co.; W. D. Kruger from Brenham taking petroleum engineering, a post adjustable triangle from the Exchange Store.

Castor Wins Lettering

L. M. Castor was the winner in class C by turning in the best freehand lettering problem. Castor, who is from San Angelo taking architecture, received a 9" x 12" portable drafting machine donated by Eugene Dietzen Company.

John L. Park, San Antonio civil engineering student, won second place in Class C and received a Wrice lettering set from the Exchange Store, while Fort Worth civil engineering major, Thomas Henderson was given a Drop Bow Pen from the Exchange Store for winning third place.

In the freehand pictorial sketch division, C. L. Pirtle from Houston, a mechanical engineering major, received a 12" x 18" portable drafting machine from the Eugene Dietzen Company.

The doors of the Annex will be open wide tomorrow for the hundreds of parents and friends who will be the guests of "Little Aggeland" students during the annual Parent's Day weekend which commences at 10 a. m. in the morning.

Annex freshmen have been seen scurrying around making last minute arrangements for the affair during the past few days. Arrangements with the housing office and Mrs. Hilliard's headquarters in the Student Center for rooms for the visitors showed down, although students waiting until the last minute found places for their guests to stay with varied amounts of difficulty.

Exhibits Open Tomorrow

Russell Thomas, chairman of the exhibit committee, was winding up final plans for the many displays and exhibits to be shown tomorrow and Sunday. Thomas reports that nearly every department represented at the Annex as well as several clubs and organizations will have some kind of show for the visitors. Although most of them will be set up in and around the Student Center, visitors will be able to see some of the achievements of Annex freshmen when they visit the class rooms.

The crowded weekend gets underway tomorrow morning with the exhibits scheduled to open at 10.

Saturday night the Little Aggeland Orchestra will furnish music for an informal dance in the Student Center for freshmen and their dates. The dance com-

mittee headed by Malcolm Dimmitt and Corkey Anderson reports that no charges will be made for the dance which begins at 9 and continues until 12 p. m.

Formation At 8:45

Sunday morning events begin at 8:45 with the flower pinning ceremony to take place in the company street as men stand in formations.

The troops will then march to the air strip for a review honoring parents and for presentation of awards to the outstanding students and the honor company.

Religious services will be held in the Chapel at 11 a. m. followed by lunch in the Mess Hall at 12 noon for students and guests.

Activities get underway again at 1:45 p. m. with the Freshman Band playing a thirty minute concert in the Student Center. The program will be composed of marches and a few numbers of a light-classical nature.

Last Performance

After the band's performance, the Freshman Drill Team will don its white leggings, belts, and helmet liners for a 15 minute show on the Intramural Field. The drill team will be putting on one of its last performances of the year when it marches Sunday.

The Freshman Tumbling Club, a group of freshman fencers, and a group of model airplane enthusiasts will furnish the rest of the entertainment for the afternoon by students.

Concluding the schedule of events will be an open house in the Student Center under the auspices of the YMCA. All students and their guests are invited to attend. Music will be furnished by the Little Aggeland Orchestra.

The publicity committee will set up an information booth Saturday afternoon and Sunday morning in front of the Administration Building.

The meeting will be held at the Flamingo Lounge at 7 p. m. Tuesday, May 16.

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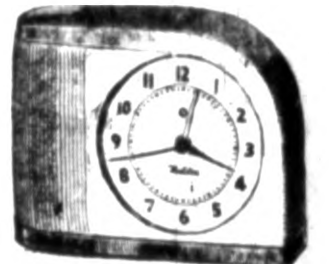
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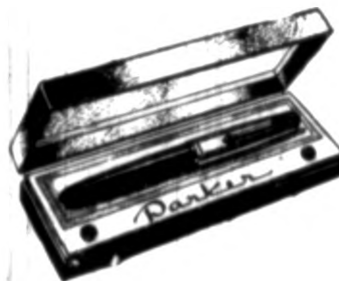
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
