# Lucy Jane Breazeale Loan Fund Grows; \$23. 50—\$785

One of the fastest growing loan funds at A&M is the Lucy Jane Breazeale Loan Fund initiated by her son W. G. (Breezy) Breazeale, dean of students at the Annex.

The fund was begun at the request of Mr. Breazeale that contributions intended for flowers, when his mother died on April 17,

1948, be used instead for a loan fund in her honor. This was the foundation on which this fund was built for the benefit of A&M Students. The original sum was \$23.50, which was matched by a twenty-five-dollar check from Mr. Breazeale.

This is the first year the fund has been made available to Annex freshmen, and it is also the first year that Mr. Breazeale has been

its custodian. Last year the Davis Bock Fund was made available for the students at the Annex.

From its first loan of fifteen dollars on the ninth of July 1948, the Breazeale Fund has grown to an approximate operating capital of \$785, and has issued more than 283 checks. The first check to be made out to a freshman at the Annex was on September 20, 1949. Since September of 1949, the fund has made loans ranging from one dollar to one-hundred dollars.

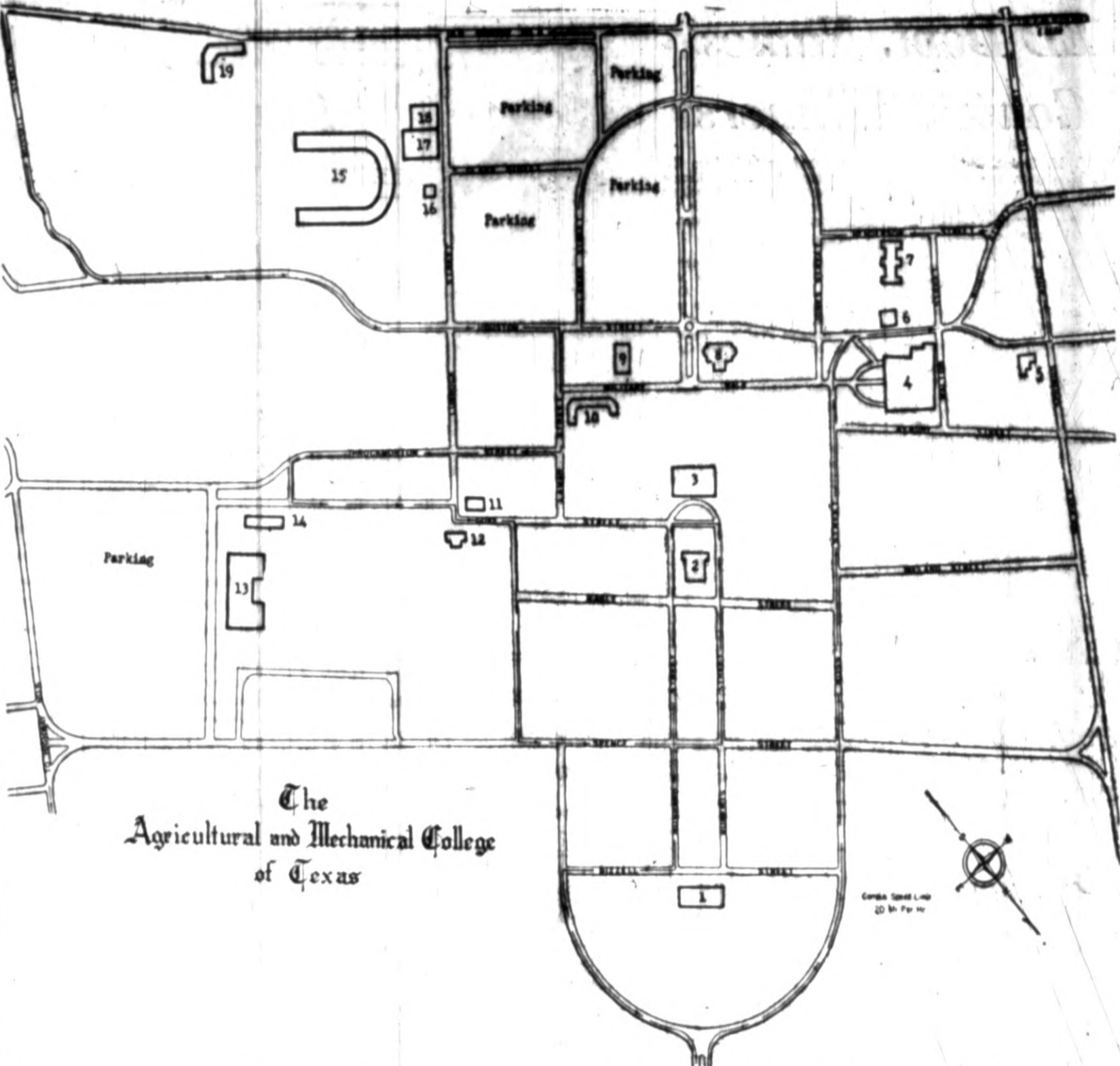
On the week-end of the Freshman Dance the fund was down to a few cents, and has repeated this performance periodically at Corps trips and holidays. Although the amount has not been completely replenished since last fall, it has increased steadily in operating capital, due to seven-hundred donations ranging from 15 cents to five dollars. The transactions are made within a minute or less, and the student is charged no interest on his loan.

Leaving through one of the monthly reports, Mr. Breazeale pointed out that several of the contributions made were remnants of coke-fund from dorms donated at the end of the summer. Another was a contribution from a disbanding senior company, and still another was a result of an auction of articles which had been left unclaimed for over two years in the lost and found department.

The average at the Annex during the first semester was nine checks a week, the loans averaging \$17.93 during the period from September 20, to December 31, 1949.

Each borrower is given a small billfold size card on which is printed a brief history of the fund and the names of the sponsors which include Breazeale, Miss Mary Lou Breazeale, and the former Miss Beulah Breazeale.

Next year the Lucy Jane Breazeale Loan Fund will continue to be made available, as well as the other three loan funds available to A&M students.

## Class '53 Appropriates Money For Awards

The Freshmen class held a meeting Wednesday evening for the purpose of considering the appropriation of money to buy medals for the Freshman Drill Team, to deal with the problem of excessive breaking of coke bottles, and to make final plans for the Parents' Day Dance tomorrow evening.

T. E. Bailey, sergeant-at-arms, recommended the appropriation of a fund by the class to buy medals for the drill team. Bailey spotlighted the fact that the drill team has spent many extra hours preparing their drill patterns so they could put on excellent performances as representatives of the college and specifically as representatives of the Freshman Class.

A motion was made and passed after some discussion to appropriate a fund to buy medals for the approximately 30 members of the drill team. Another motion was made and passed authorizing the officers of the class to decide which type of medal should be awarded. Price of the medals was estimated as "somewhat less than

two dollars." During a recent month more than 649 worth of coke bottles have been broken resulting in the addition of a little more than \$2 to the class fund, H. B. Purvis, corps vice president, reported.

J. M. Yantis, Class '53 secretary, reported that the Little Aggiedland Orchestra has been hired to play for the Parents' Day Dance tomorrow night on the concrete slab between the Student Center and The Snack Bar. The committee decided not to serve refreshments, but to leave the Snack Bar open. This move was made so that the class would not have to buy coffee and cookies with class money.

R. G. Anderson, class treasurer, made his financial report. In recent months \$164 has been paid out for the missing Cavalry Squadron flag and \$134 for damages to the special study halls, Anderson reported.

President F. C. Bolton and Mrs. Bolton will be honored at a dinner in Shisa Hall, May 27, at 7 p. m. President Bolton will become president emeritus in June after 42 years with the college.
