Fencers Enter State Tourney In Galveston

Nine members of A&M's fencing team left for Galveston this morning to participate in the State Final Meet of the Amateur Fencers' League of America, the big one of the year in the Cadet team.

A&M is entering teams in both foil and epee competition, with individual entries in all four divisions: prep, novice, junior and open.

The meet, scheduled for today and tomorrow, will be the last time the cadets pick up their weapons when wearing the Stars and Stripes. They are team captain Gus Mott and Gerald Monks. The duo has been to four State Meets in four years.

Represents South

The Galveston meet will bring together collegiate and club teams from Texas, two sections north and south. A&M will represent the southern division in foil and epee. Rice in sabre competition, and the Galveston Buccaneers in all three weapons for the epee teams.

Entries from the northern division are not known.

Teams qualified in a previous round.

Entered in the meet from A&M are Mott, Monks and John Gottlob, composing the foil team; Gus Mott, Jay Myers and Gottlob for the epee group.

In individual entries, Frank Raguse (sabre), Mike Nicholas (foil), Emmett Jensen (epee), and Dick Jones (sabre) are in the prep division.

In the novice section, Monks has entered in both foil and epee. Mott will use the foil and sabre in the junior category with Wilson entered in the open epee.

Ag Baseballers Lick Bears, 11-4

A&M's baseball team clinched second place in the SWC diamond derby yesterday afternoon on Kyle Field, humbling Baylor, 11-4, behind the seven-hit hurling of Pat Hubert.

If the Aggies beat Baylor today and sweep the two games with Texas next week in Austin, the pennant is theirs. Game-time today is at 3 p.m.

A&M piled up six runs before the Bruins scored in the sixth. Cadet batters clouted losing pitcher Clyde Robinson for two hits and three runs in the first.

Leaves In Third

The Ags rested one frame, then blasted the tall right hander from the mound in the third.

Moon encouraged a free trip to first from Robinson after shipping a line drive foul over the right field fence. After Shug McPherson's infield single moved Moon to second, the Ag centerfielder scored off DeWitt's second inning.

McPherson and DeWitt moved second and third on Larry Isbell's overthrow of home. Then Robinson was relieved by Fred Copeland who allowed one run off 4 passed ball before retiring the side.

Copeland Tight

Copeland blanked the Aggie side in three frames, retiring the side in three appearances. In the fourth and one in the fifth as a result of two Aggie errors.

The Aggies exhibited from their three inning dormancy in the sixth, registering four runs off singles by Yale Lary and Wally Moon, a double by Hank Gooden and two Brain bunties.

Baylor scored its only earned runs in the eighth. Clyde Robinson, on the ground, singled to right

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Buddy Parker duplicated the feat, this time McPherson finished, allowing the runners to pull up at second and third.

Final Tally

The final Maroon marker came in the eighth when Joe Savarino singled to center, advanced to third on two infield outs, and scored off McPherson's infield hit.

It was A&M's second victory over Baylor, having defeated the Bears in Waco, 4-3, in the conference debut. Sam Blanton, with two wins and two losses to his credit, will probably get the nod in the final this afternoon.

More Rain, Yet . . .

The weather man predicted more showers today, and not much likelihood of a change for the better Saturday.

Real weather and a good track could play a major part in determining whether Texas A&M or Texas will be the champion Aggie.

The Aggies are that confident. One of the meet's most noted strategists, A&M will have an outside chance in the track preliminary events on Tuesday and Wednesday.

Aggie officials will probably be disappointed with the Aggie's performance in the track preliminary events today, but they are confident of a good showing in the final events of 3 p.m.

Wet Track Mars Hope Of Records

Austin, Tex., May 12.—(AP) Rain yesterday soaked the track and soured hopes for new records in the Southwest Conference track and field meet which starts here today.

DeBerry Loses Second Round

First round results included: Raymond Rude, SMU, beat Jack Kending, Baylor, 6-2, 6-3; Carroll Freewer, Baylor, beat Jack Levinson, TU, 6-3, 6-3; Bill Stark, Baylor, beat James Wilson, TU, 6-3, 1-6, 6-0.

The first-year Cadets enter today's fray with a 5-2 seasonal record, with losses to Texas University's Shortbush and to the Cubs.

Starting pitcher for the Fish will probably be either Bill Stirling or Jack Brinkley.

Cadets Aiming at 4th Straight Track Crown

The Southwest Conference Track and Field Meet began today in Austin with defending champion A&M attempting to defend its title against strong competitor Texas University and a hoard of individual stars.

Many of these stars are potential record-breakers.

Texas' aggregation is the leading challenger for the favored Cadets, and the two will wage a terrific battle right down to possibly the last event tomorrow.

Parker Leads

Led by Charlie Parker, ace sprinter, the Steers look like winners in three or four events at least, plus a hoard of second and third places.

Rice Institute will be favored for the third spot in the meet and may furnish the meet's outstanding participants, with such boys as Vern McGrew, Tobin Rote, Red Brown, and Tom Cox, in addition to two track relay teams.

Besides the College Station lads mentioned yesterday, some potential record-breakers might well be both Rice's 400 and mile relay squads. They have done 41.2 and

3:14.5 respectively as compared with conference records of 41.8 and 3:14.9.

Cox Ready

Rice's Cox is capable of breaking the 440-yard dash record of 47.3 set by Holbrook of A&M last year, but that will probably depend on the weather, the lane he draws, and whether or not he has a good day.

James Brown of Arkansas ran the two-mile event in 9:24 last week as compared with the 9:30 record. He and J. D. Hampton of A&M should make quite a race of it Saturday.

Now for an actual prediction. We are doubtful of picking all the individual winners, especially in the 880, two-mile, high jump, and broad jump. We will still, however, hazard a guess and hope it as close to accuracy as last week's.

We'll also take a stab at the rest of the places and stick our neck out so far as to say the meet will be as follows: A&M—58, Texas—52!

880-yard dash: Hoff (Rice—if he runs, Hawkinson (Texas); Garmany (A&M); Brifford (Arkansas).

1 mile: Hampton (A&M); Sparks (Texas); Herring (A&M); Brooks (Texas).

Two mile: Hampton, Brown (Arkansas); Herring; Whisnant, (Texas).

Low hurdles: Leming (A&M); Walker (SMU); Valls (Baylor); Parsons (Texas).

440-yard relay: Rice; Texas; Baylor; Arkansas.

1 mile relay: Rice; A&M; Texas; Arkansas.

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
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A gift for the graduate! What shall it be? A pen, a watch, clothes, money? Yes, any of these gifts will bring joy to the young graduate.
