Three-Event Sport Week Closes Play

They'll ring down the curtain on Texas A&M's 1949-50 sports program this week.

Only three events are on the schedule. Monday afternoon, the Brazos County A&M Club will honor Aggie athletes who participated in the winter and spring sports of basketball, baseball, track and field, tennis, golf, swimming and fencing.

The Lipscomb-Coleman trophies will be awarded to captains of the basketball, baseball and track teams and to athletes who were elected "most valuable" in these sports.

Marty Karow's Aggie baseball nine plays Texas in Austin Wednesday and Thursday afternoons, closing the 1950 diamond slate. The Aggies hold 1950 baseball victories over all teams except Texas. Karow is expected to call on right-handers Sam Blanton and Pat Hubert to face the Longhorns.

Several athletes who are to represent Texas A&M at the NCAA track and field meet in Minnesota in June will continue in training.

Texas City Ship Wreckage Cleared

Texas City, Tex. (AP)—After nearly a year of work, most of the wreckage of the two ships which sank in the Texas City water-front disaster of 1947 has been cleared away.

Capt. W. A. Bisco, Jr., of the Army Engineers, in charge of the clearing operations, estimated that 1,300 tons of scrap metal has been cut up and hauled away, and that nearly 300 tons remain in the dock area.

Work of removing the wreckage of the ships, the High Flyer and the Wilson B. Keene, was started under direction of the Galveston District Office of the Engineers June 20, 1949. The ships foundered after the giant explosion that wrecked the French freighted Grand Camp.

Sportsmanship Award Is Set For Tomorrow

The annual presentation of the Southwest Conference Sportsmanship Trophy and Award will take place tomorrow afternoon during the SWC Track Meet.

The trophy, which was won last year by A&M, will be taken to Austin tomorrow morning for presentation to this year's winning school. SMU was winner for the year 1947-48.

Method of selection for the winning school is as follows: Each person polled will select three schools from among the seven conference members who, in his opinion, best displayed the characteristics of true sportsmanship.

Rating Methods He will rate these schools according to their relative merit in first, second, and third positions with points to be given in the following manner—five points for first place, three points for second place, and two points for third place.

The school that receives the largest total number of votes will be selected as the winner of the award.

Balloting is done by representatives from each of the seven conference schools, a representative group of conference athletic officials selected by the conference secretary, and the Executive Secretary of the Conference.

School representatives polled will be the student newspaper editor, the head yell leader, the dean of men, the athletic director, an official of the former students association, and members of the student government.

The number of the school's votes usually depends on how well that school has lived up to the requests of the Sportsmanship Code, as drafted by the committee.

sophomore students who elect to live with the Corps of Cadets and all seniors and juniors who have ROTC contracts will be housed in the dormitories set aside for the Corps of Cadets. At present sophomore students who take military training have no choice as to living quarters, being automatically housed in the Corps of Cadets.

Juniors and seniors who take military training but have not received ROTC contracts have in the past been allowed to live with the Corps of Cadets. Under the new rule, sophomore students are still required to take military training if they are eligible, but have a choice as to housing.

Graduate students, students not qualified for military training, veterans exempt from military training, and sophomores who elect to live in this area will be housed in civilian dormitories.

The Corps of Cadets will be formed into appropriate military units as it is now. Senior cadets who are not cadet officers and all transfer students taking military training who so elect, will be formed into separate units. The Board order specified that the Corps of Cadets is to function as a strictly military organization under rules and regulations set up by the College staff and approved by the Board of Directors.

All ROTC students will be required to be habitually in uniform. Wearing of the uniform is to be restricted to ROTC students. Any distinction as to uniform between classes will be defined by college regulations.

All students who are physically qualified, under 21 years of age, and with freshman classification on entrance will be required to take two years of military training as in the past. The changes provided by the Board order becomes effective in September.
