



Preliminaries End For Mural Track

Preliminaries in the annual intramural track meet came off with a high yesterday afternoon at the Kyle Field track, and today's prelims are also set with good weather predicted for the rest of the meet.

Pre-meet favorite, A Athletics, qualified entrants for the finals in the 880-yard relay, 880-yard run, and the broad jump to be one of the leaders in the contest. Other strong teams include A Coast Artillery, A Ordnance, and B Engineers.

Today's events will include the 100-yard dash, 120-yard hurdles, 140-yard relay and the shot put with the meet getting underway at 5 p. m.

Qualifying Men
Qualifiers for the finals in the 440-yard dash included the first three places of each heat. Meeting

Texas Takes SWC Title In 5-0 Defeat of Aggies

Held to only five hits yesterday by Texas pitcher Murry Wall, the Aggie baseball team dropped its next-to-last season game to the Longhorns in Austin, 5-0. And with the game went any chance A&M was entertaining for the conference title.

The Steers closed the title again by scoring one run in the first inning, then adding to their total by touching home base four times in the fifth.

Starting pitcher for the Cadets was Pat Hubert, who entered the game with a 5-0 conference hurling record—the best in the loop. When the game was over, however, Hubert had a 5-1 record was relieved by George Brown.

Texas has now won 28 titles and shared in another in 35 seasons of conference play. Best Aggie hitting of the game from the bat of all-conference shortstop Guy Wallace, who collected two for four. Second baseman Joe Savarino, centerfielder Wally Moon, and left fielder John DeWitt picked up a hit each

to account for the rest of the Cadet bingles.

Today the Aggies will try again, but with no chance for any share of the crown. Should the Cadets win, however, it would be a moral victory, though anti-climatic for the Karow crew.

Probable starting hurler in today's fray will be Sam Blanton, sophomore curve ball artist. The remainder of the lineup will probably remain unchanged, unless Coach Karow decides to let everybody in the final game.

Three men will play—or see—their last game tomorrow in the uniform of the Maroon and White.

Calvert's Last
Big Jim Calvert, recently chosen captain of the squad, will don the mask and take his position behind the plate for the last time. Calvert's hitting and expert field guidance have been a major factor in the Cadet's getting as far as they did in the always-rough SWC race.

Bruce Morrisie, Ag southpaw hurler, may see action tomorrow, since it will be his last game also. Morrisie was counted upon this year to bolster a generally weak pitching staff but failed to find his control.

Maltz, first sacker. Although he has been replaced quite a bit lately by Yalf Lary, Maltz has held down the initial base efficiently throughout the season.

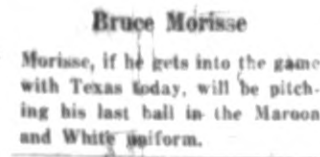

Major Loop Clubs Get Down to Limit

New York, May 18. (AP)—A three-way shuffle involving Pittsburgh, Brooklyn and the New York Giants featured nasty maneuverings by the major league baseball clubs yesterday to get down to the 25-player limit before the midnight deadline.
The Giants bought third baseman Johnny Jorgensen from the Dodgers for an undisclosed sum of cash and sold veteran catcher Ray Mueller to the Athletics for more than the \$10,000 waiver price.
The Pirates sold pitcher John McCall to Indianapolis in the American Association.
Clubs in Limit
The deals brought all three National League clubs within the prescribed limit.
The Giant's excess man — Out fielder Mike McCormack — is not in uniform while the club is awaiting word on waivers.
The St. Louis Cardinals got down to size by shipping outfielder Johnny Blatnik to Houston in the Texas League.
The Cards had to dispose of Blatnik because they bought Johnny Lindell from the New York Yankees. Pitcher Ted Wilks and First Baseman Nippy Jones are on the disabled list.
Cubs Cut
The Chicago Cubs reduced their roster to 25 by sending catcher Carl Sawatski to Nashville in the Southern Association.
The Cincinnati Reds opted Southpaw Pitcher Kent Peterson to Syracuse of the International League.
Cleveland had trouble making up its mind but wound up sending infielder Johnny Berardino and First Baseman Herb Conyers to San Diego of the Pacific Coast League.
At first the Indians announced pitcher Sam Zoldak was being optioned but decided they'd better not do that, their pitcher staff.

No Little Rock Wins — Another Bryan-CS Nine

Little Rock Ark., May 18.—(AP)—How woeful can a baseball team get? Well, Little Rock's Southern Association entry may supply the answer.
The travelers have lost 27 of their first 30 games—21 of them in a row to set a league record—and are so deep in the cellar they may never get out of it.
Even the law of averages doesn't favor them.
Individually, the players are better than the team's record. Little Rock outfielder Ken Humphrey is the Southern's leading hitter with a .37 average. Four of his mates are batting above .300.
One night Jim Lawrence pitched a neat six-hitter but lost, 2-1, to Mobile. The next night Lou Lombardo gave Mobile eight hits in ten innings. He also lost, 2-1.
No coordination
Moaned Manager Jack Saltzgraver: "We can't get hitting and pitching together. Then, we get hit, but it seems they can't produce runs."
In a recent game at Nashville Little Rock produced 11 hits—one run.
The lack of timely hitting hasn't been the only shortcoming. Fielding hasn't been double-A caliber, and there have been lapses of headwork. In one game two runners wound up on third base. When they realized their plight, one took out for home the other started back to second. Both were put out.
Saltzgraver had counted on more help from the Detroit chain, but both the Tigers and their triple-A farm, Toledo, have been slow in cutting their rosters. Little Rock is independently owned but has a working agreement with Detroit.
