Woman Starts Scholarship Yet Never Saw A&M Campus

This is the story of Cornelia Cooke Smith and her devotion to education of the youth of Texas.

Ever heard of her? Probably not—but, as one person recently pointed out, "in the hearts of the men of the A&M College of Texas her name is enshrined as a permanent symbol of that goodness in mankind which creates the desire to extend a helping hand down through the ages to the deserving youth of the future."

This lady, who probably never visited the campus, died in 1946. Her will read in part: "The remain-

ing one-half of the residue I give to A&M College at College Station, Texas, this to be used to help poor Texas-born students, male and white, get an education."

Cornelia Cooke Smith was a native Texan. She was born at Marshfield, the daughter of Capt. William Warren Cooke of Wheeler's Cavalry under the great Southern general, Bedford Forrest. She spent her early life on her father's farm.

She married Walter Franklin Smith, owner of a typewriter agency and stationary store in Shreveport, La. Later they operated a similar business in Buffalo, New York.

Widowed at 59, childless and with only a few scattered kin, she returned to her native Texas. She made her living as curator of the O. Henry Museum at Austin.

Her opportunities had been limited. She had ambitions. She encouraged many a young person to get an education.

And then something happened—she was heir to a small fortune. She continued her work at the museum, retiring only a year before her death, at the age of 73.

And the educational life of at least one boy each year at A&M College will be made secure.

Because Cornelia Cooke Smith bequeathed A&M \$100,000. The gift is invested in government securities.

Its income (only the income is used as the principal of the fund) is inviolate; provides a scholarship which makes it possible for a worthy boy to remain in school each year as long as there is an A&M College.

Texas Doctor Gets Research Grant

Dr. Daniel E. Jenkins, Texas physician, is one of 26 scientific investigators conducting research on tuberculosis to receive a grant from the National Tuberculosis Association, announced Miss Pansy Nichols, executive secretary of the Texas Tuberculosis Association.

Dr. Jenkins of Baylor University College of Medicine, is one of a group of Baylor investigators who are carrying out a well planned study of the antibiotic as an anti-tuberculous agent.

The grant to the Texas physician is part of a large research program inaugurated in 1921, said Miss Nichols, pointing out that research program has been vastly expanded as increased funds have been available from the Christmas seal sale.
