

# 'Christopher' Movie Given by Inter-Faiths

The production was directed by Leo McCarey and had a cast of many top Hollywood stars.

According to the movie the Christopher Movement is composed of lay people in our country who are willing and anxious to play the role of Christophers (Greek for Christ bearers) in many walks of life.

These Christophers work quietly, not sensationally. They do not engage in fanfare or flagwaving. The simple task of each is to insist on truth where others are furthering falsehood; to establish order where others are spreading chaos; to bring in love where others are striving to bring in hatred. Each knows that whatever his limitations, he has the power to wield far-reaching influence for the betterment of the world.

Nothing To Join  
To play the role of Christopher, one need not "join" anything more. There are no meetings, no dues. The small amount of financial assistance needed for miscellaneous needs is being supplied by a group of friends.

The distinguishing mark of a Christopher should be "love of all people." Therefore, the object of the Christopher movement is to develop a sense of personal responsibility and initiative in bringing back into the market place

the major truths which alone guarantee peace for all mankind.

## Christopher Ways

The ways of transmitting the principles of the movement are:  
1. By listening to those in trouble—many who are confused, in sorrow, in doubt, or discouraged want to talk to someone. A kind word, a helping hand, listening to those in trouble may often be the means of bringing the peace of Christ into their lives.

2. By informing those who know not—most of the hundred million in our country actually hunger for the teachings of Christ, but too few Christians are interested in them, as well as in the billion in paganism over the world.

3. By interest in evil-doers—rather than devote attention to "saving the saved," one of the chief objectives of the Christophers should be to reach those who are farthest from Christ and therefore need Him most.

4. By taking part in public life—this is the strict duty of all citizens.

**ORDNANCE NO 184**

An ordinance making it unlawful to discharge any firearm within the limits of the city, defining firetrap and providing a penalty.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF COLLEGE STATION:

1. It shall be unlawful to shoot a firearm within the limits of the city.

2. A firearm shall include specifically but not exclusively any shotgun, pistol, rifle and rifle, B. B. gun, or any other mechanism that discharges of gas and bullet through or any other metallic mechanism or air.

3. Anyone violating this ordinance shall be guilty of misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined not more than fifty dollars nor more than fifty days in jail.
