

Two Baccalaureate Services Set for Graduating Seniors

Candidates for the Ph. D. degree will wear caps and gowns, candidates for the Master's degree will wear civilian clothes, and candidates for the Bachelor degree will wear uniform number one except for those who are non-military.

The Final Review will conclude the two-day program June 3, at 9:30 a. m. on the Main Drill Field. All candidates for degrees are required to attend the baccalaureate and commencement exercises unless officially excused by the Executive Committee.

General Bradley will be the speaker in Guion Hall at 1 p. m. Friday for the presentation of reserve commissions. The president's reception will follow at 2:30 p. m. in the home of President P. C. Bolton for all graduates and their relatives and families.

Activities for Friday will be climaxed with the Final Ball which is to be held in Shiss Hall at 9 p. m.
