### SWC Nines Finish, but TU at NCAA

The Southwest Conference baseball campaign is at an end and all teams have stowed away the spikes for the year, except champion Texas which still has some NCAA play-off business to attend to.

Texas won the title by a five-game margin last week, putting on the clincher with a 5-0 victory over A&M, then adding a 6-5 win over the Aggies for good measure.

Baylor licked Southern Methodist twice, 5-0 and 3-2, to close out in third place in the standings, a game behind the Aggies. SMU in turn upset TCU, 9-5, to drop the Frogs into fourth place.

Texas will play Arizona, champion of the Border Conference, at Austin, June 5, 6, and 7, to determine this district's representative in the NCAA tournament at Omaha, Neb., June 14-21.

Texas has a 20-4 record for the season. Arizona has won 27, lost 2 and tied one.

#### Aggies to Open NTSC Cage Season Next Year

Denton, Tex., May 23.—(AP)—The Texas Aggies will provide the opposition when the North Texas State basketball team opens the 1951 season Dec. 1 at Denton.

The occasion will also mark the dedication of NTSC's modern \$400,000 gymnasium now under construction.

Los Angeles, May 23.—(AP)—The Los Angeles Rams of the National Football League yesterday announced the signing of McKissack, Southern Methodist University fullback, to a 1950 contract.

McKissack was one of the spark-plugs of the strong SMU team, and his key blocking cleared the way for many of the sparkling runs of Doak Walker. The 195-pound Texan accounted for 1075 yards running himself during his college career, and boasts exceptional speed for his size; he was all-Southwest conference fullback in 1948.

### Cadet Baseballers To Play in Summer

Now that the regular SWC baseball campaign is over, the chief concern of A&M's baseballers, other than final exams, is the somewhat more pleasant thought of semi-pro ball.

College players look to the summer months for fun and relaxation, since they will undertake their specialty—baseball—without the hindrance of bookwork.

Nine active Aggies will make up the greater part of a re-organized Columbus Cardinals team, located near San Antonio.

Cadet hurlers going to the team, organized by the Chasly Herder Trucking Company, are sophomore Sam Blanton and Bob Tankersley.

Those thinking very seriously of joining are Joe Savarino and Joe Ecrette, second sackers; Lester Lacky, utility infielder; Hank Cardelari, third baseman; Yale Lary, first baseman; Martin Brantton, catcher, and Hollis Baker, outfielder.

One of the reasons motivating the accumulation of so many Aggies is to keep them together during the "off season," A&M graduates dominate the recruiting personnel.

**Ogletree to Weimar**  
Catcher Al Ogletree will combine forces with the state champion Weimar unit, about 15 miles from Columbus.

Regular right fielder Shug McPherson is carefully contemplating negotiations with the Ailing nine, and he is expected to join the team.

Wally Moon, unanimous choice for the conference center field berth is faced with a three-sided dilemma. Two semi-pro teams in Arkansas, near Weimar's home town, the Alpine aggregation, and many major league scouts are beckoning for his services.

The question of whether or not Moon will turn pro is supposed to be decided June 3. At that time, the star center fielder will invite the big league boys to his home to engage in a round-table discussion with him and his family.

**Wallace Faces Choice**  
Another all conference choice, Guy Wallace, will decide between Alpine or Elk City, the latter being the probable place.

Pat Hubert, the third Maroon member to nail down an all conference slot, will hurl for the Plymouth Oilers in Sinton.

Hondo Taylor and George Brown, two mound mainstays, will play for Cuero and Stephenville, respectively. Pitcher Sid Goodloe has not centered his intentions, but it will be a team in or near Abilene.

Bruce Morris, graduating southpaw from Northam, entered the professional ranks last night, signing with the New York Giant team. He will join the End, Oklahoma class team.

Herschel Maltz, while entering business this summer with his father, will play for Rosenberg. Maltz missed the two game series with Texas because of a ruptured blood vessel near his right knee.

Maltz was afflicted in a practice session the Monday after the Baylor games. He is expected to be ready for action within a month.

John Calvert, captain of the Baylor team, has decided to enter business and is not interested in playing ball.

Chicago, May 23.—(AP)—Eddie Malone's pinch single scored Jim Busby, a substitute base runner, with the winning run last night as the Chicago White Sox defeated the Boston Red Sox, 10-9 in a three-hour and 31 minute, 10 inning game.

Lefty Hal Newhouser showed lots of his old time pitching form yesterday as he twirled the Detroit Tigers to a 5-1 win over the Washington Senators, scattering eight hits along the way.

Newhouser, making his second start of the season, after coming up with a sore shoulder in spring training, had a six hit shutout going into the ninth.

Dick Kryhoski and Johnny Lajon led an 11-hit attack with Senator starting pitcher Ray Scarborough absorbing most of the punishment.

Kryhoski got the Tiger scoring underway with a three-run homer in the second inning after the game had been held up 14 minutes by a rainstorm. It was the Tiger's second triumph over Scarborough who now has a record of three wins and four losses.

Still on the rampage, New York's Yankees drove out 10 safeties behind Vic Raschi's five-hit pitching last night to scalp the Cleveland Indians 7-2 and make a clean sweep of their three game series.

Don Newcombe once again proved that his shoulder trouble is a thing of the past when he pitched the Brooklyn Dodgers to an eighth, 5-1 triumph over the Cincinnati Reds in the only National League game played last night.

### MJC Again Try To Close 'Old' Pimlico

Baltimore, May 23.—(AP)—The Maryland Jockey Club is going to make another stab at closing old Pimlico where the 14th Preakness was run last Saturday.

Henry A. Parr, 85, club president, announced today an "independent" jury is being made to show what continued operation will mean.

The study is assigned to John Sloan, former president of the National Association of State Race Commissioners, from New York. The Jockey Club wants to move to Laurel, where it can build a larger and modern plant. The club also owns Laurel. It tried to do that in 1949 after considerable political maneuvering. Governor Lane pulled out and a bill authorizing the transfer was amended and eventually vetoed.

By the move, Pimlico's 25 racing days and more than half a billion dollars of improvement funds would have gone to Laurel.

Parr repeated today the 1949 arguments for closing 80-year-old Pimlico: too small, ramshackle and no room to expand into a modern racing plant.

St. Andrews, Scotland, May 23.—(AP)—Bing Crosby won every thing but his match in the British Amateur Golf Tournament yesterday.

### Parker Topped Seven Teams Qualified For State AA Tourney

Los Angeles, May 23.—(AP)—Texas lost to Stanford Friday night in the 440-yard relay as anchorman Gay Bryan held off a burst of speed by Charley Parker for a close dispute.

Stanford, California, was third, Rice fourth, and Oklahoma A&M fifth as the Texans won in 40.9 seconds to highlight the tenth annual Los Angeles Coliseum Relays. The set until the final lap a delayed pass slowing down the Texans and Stanford took over.

Medford, Calif., May 22.—(AP)—Timmer toping star Dick Atlesey of Southern California, who held the world's 120 yard high hurdles record a week ago in Fresno, won his specialty easily Saturday night in the annual California Relays.

Southern California distance relay team won the event in the relays record breaking time of 10:01. The time was only 14 seconds slower than the world's record set in 1938 by North Texas Teachers College.

East Donga Anderson of California won the open-intercollegiate 300-yard dash in 9.5 seconds, beating Charles Parker of Texas by nearly four yards. Dick Stolpe of the Okla. A&M Aggies was third. Nofels and Howard Bugbee, unattached, 3-5-0.

Stanford won the 440 yard relay in 1:37 seconds flat, with Texas-Adams and UCLA placing in that order. The University of Southern California team actually took second but was disqualified for an illegal pass of the baton on the third pass.
