

'Fraud' Charge Thrown In New McCarthy Stand

Washington, May 25.—(AP)—Republican Senator McCarthy Wednesday accused the State Department of trying to sell the American people a "deliberate fraud and deception" in the case of Owen Lattimore.

The Wisconsin legislator said he will "expose" the alleged deception in a speech tonight before a convention of Catholic editors at Rochester, N. Y.

At that time, he said, he will make public the photographic copies of "pertinent parts" of government loyalty files bearing on the Lattimore case.

McCarthy has named Lattimore, a Johns Hopkins University professor and occasional State Department consultant on Far East affairs, as Russia's No. 1 spy in the United States. Lattimore has denied the charge under oath and called McCarthy a liar.

McCarthy told newsmen the files he plans to disclose are from the

loyalty records of the old Office of War Information (OWI). He said the original documents are now held by the State Department.

During the war, Lattimore served as deputy director of OWI in charge of Pacific operations.

Department Denies Report

The State Department has declared it has no loyalty file on Lattimore and said the Far East expert was never on its payroll.

In explaining why he plans to make the documents public, McCarthy said in a statement: "If this were merely for the purpose of furnishing a link in the Lattimore chain of evidence, I would not produce these files in public at this time.

"It is necessary, however, to make these files available to the United States. Lattimore has denied the charge under oath and called McCarthy a liar.

McCarthy told newsmen the files he plans to disclose are from the

credit the facts and evidence which I have produced."

McCarthy told reporters he meant the "White Paper" issued by Assistant Secretary of State Edward W. Barrett in reply to a speech McCarthy made to the American Society of Newspaper Editors on April 20.

In that speech, McCarthy reviewed his case against Lattimore and attacked Secretary of State Acheson. Barrett in turn issued a point-by-point reply to many of McCarthy's accusations.

He said he has carefully eliminated "any material which might in any way interfere with the workings of our investigative agencies."

Today after McCarthy came up with his new attack, the State Department said it has a loyalty report on Lattimore from records of the now defunct OWI.

Press officer Lincoln White declined to disclose the contents of the report.

He said no action has been taken on the basis of the OWI data on Lattimore because Lattimore was not among OWI employees transferred to the State Department when OWI was absorbed by the Department at the end of the war.

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Consolidated Gives Babe Ruth Award

A&M Consolidated High School is one of a thousand high schools in 29 states which are cooperating in a new sportsmanship program named in honor of Babe Ruth, according to L. E. Bose, principal.

Lloyd S. Michael, principal of Evanston Township High School, Evanston, Ill., and chairman of the National Babe Ruth Sportsmanship Award Committee, said the purpose of the program is to "disseminate information on and enlist enthusiasm for, good sportsmanship and fair play throughout the schools and to the general public."

The program has been started on an experimental basis this year under a grant of funds from the Babe Ruth Foundation and it is expected to be expanded to include more schools in 1950-1951.

Communist Youths Told To Avoid Western Area

Berlin, May 24.—(AP)—East Germany's blue-shirted Communist youth got a warning from their own police yesterday to keep out of Western Berlin on their Whitstide demonstration march.

This put the final damper on boasts from some Communist quarters that half a million young Reds—whose advance formations already were massing here—would storm all Berlin this weekend.

Eastern Berlin police told them they would find trouble—as allied authorities and Western German police already had said—if they crossed the line.

Professional Cage Team Buys Negro

New York, May 25.—(AP)—The New York Knickerbockers set a National Basketball Association precedent yesterday by purchasing the contract of Nat (Sweetwater) Clifton, star center and leading scorer of the famed Harlem Globetrotters.

Clifton thus became the first Negro player to enter the ranks of the professional circuit. Several other NBA clubs are dickering for the services of Negro centers.

The purchase price for the 6-7 225-pound star was not disclosed. It would be no surprise if the Knicks paid more than \$10,000 for him.

An all-around athlete, the 26-year-old Chicagoan is tied up in baseball by the Cleveland Indians. Currently he is playing first base for Wilkes-Barre, Cleveland's Eastern League farm.

The lanky Negro ace started at Chicago's Du Sable High and at Xavier of New Orleans.

He led the Globetrotters in scoring during their recent national tour with the collegiate all-stars, netting 272 points in 14 games.

Britain Wants Reds Seated, Nationalists Ousted in UN

London, May 25.—(AP)—Britain's Labor government came out yesterday for admission of Red China to the United Nations.

The announcement was made by Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin almost simultaneously with a cautiously worded statement from U. N. Secretary-General Trygve Lie saying there is hope of ending the cold war by careful negotiation.

Diplomatic sources in Paris said France will not stand in the way of admitting China Communists to the U. N.

The American position, about the same as the French, is that the United States will not sponsor Red China but will agree to any majority decision.

Russia has boycotted U. N. meetings since last Jan. 10 because of the presence of Chiang Kai-Shek's Nationalist delegates, contending their big power seats now belong to Mao Tse-Tung's Reds.

Observers speculated that the China diplomatic developments sprang partly at least from Lie's current save-the-U. N. mission. It has taken him in a month to

the four big power capitals—Washington, London, Paris and Moscow—and part of the way back on a second round.

Since leaving Moscow, where he had a 90-minute talk last week with Prime Minister Joseph Stalin, Lie revisited the top officials of France and Britain. He expects to see President Truman and Secretary of State Acheson in Washington again next week.

Informed sources said there may be a special meeting of the U. N. Security Council in Europe, possibly Geneva, this summer with foreign ministers or even government heads sitting in.

Lie has campaigned openly for several weeks for seating Red China in the U. N. as a "common sense" means of getting Russia back and in recognition of Mao's actual rule over the China mainland and its 470,000,000 people.

Before departing by plane to night at the end of his European tour, Lie made a formal statement saying a basis exists for constructive negotiations to reduce

the tensions of the cold war.

"I can only say that I am not dissatisfied with my talks in the three European capitals," Lie's statement said. "I return to the headquarters of the United Nations with the belief that the possibility of constructive negotiation exists."

"But the results of these exchanges of view and ideas on the United Nations and the so-called 'cold war' cannot be judged except as they become apparent during the next two or three months. It is necessary to be patient."
