

Ag Tracksters Out to Reclaim Conference Title—Next Year

The Texas Aggies track and field team, runner-up to Texas in the conference meet, will be out to reclaim the title next year after having held the crown for three straight years.

Winning five of seven meets this year, the Aggies under stars Ed Herring, runner-up in the 100-yard dash, and Bob Hall, low hurdler specialist, Paul Leming, soph high hurdler; Jack Simpson and Don Graves, pole vaulters; Julian Herring and John McMahon, miler, and Don Mitchell and Bernard Place, quartermilers.

Probable Lettermen

Although lettermen have not been announced as yet, they will probably include Billy Bloss, low hurdler; Buddy Davis, high jumper; Ed Hooker, miler; Jerry Bonner and Jim McMahon, 2-mile; Alex Ortiz, 800; and quartermilers Don Carlin, Buddy Shaeffer, and Cecil Ingelhart.

Aside from the seven, meets mentioned the Aggies entered in the nation's big three relay carnivals, Texas, Kansas and Drake Relays, and garnered a first and some records in all three. Kadera won the 440 at Texas and Kansas and Leming won the low hurdles at Drake. The A&M mile relay took second at Kansas and the 4-mile relay took second at Texas and Kansas while Kadera repeated last year's efforts as the second at Drake.

Texas led by Charley Parker, winner of the 100 and 220, and Bob Walters, who won the high jump and pole vault, dominated the conference meet May 11 with 6 firsts and a host of places in A&M's 11 firsts and 44 places.
