Morgan Old Hand Around CS Area

Lucian Morgan, class of '35, has been recently appointed as representative of the American General Life Insurance Company of Houston for this area.

Morgan is by no means a newcomer to this area, since his father, J. O. Morgan, was head of the Agronomy Department until his death in 1932.

The Morgans lived in a house located on the plot where the new Memorial Student Center is now standing when Morgan was a freshman in Law Hall, and he claims it came in handy for snoozing over and catching a snooze occasionally.

While at A&M, Morgan was a member of the Market and Finance Club, Captain of A Field Artillery, the Rose Volunteers, and in charge of student janitors. He graduated in 1935 with a Bachelor's Degree in Business and his Master's was awarded in 1938.

After working in east Texas for the AAA and in Amarillo for the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation, he came back to A&M in late 1939 and opened the placement office under the auspices of the Association of Former Students. He remained in that position until 1941 when he went into the service.

He entered the service with the rank of first lieutenant and was discharged in 1946 with the rank of colonel.

He was awarded the Legion of

Merit for the work he did in classifying and assigning personnel at Camp Robinson, Ark., and is now Adjutant General of the 4608th Logistical Training Division, a local ORC unit.

Morgan has his office on the third floor of the Astin Building in Bryan and lives in College Station with his wife and two children. They are members of the First Baptist Church in Bryan, and are active in civic and community affairs.

This curly-headed, blonde, blue-eyed and jovial fellow is well remembered by most Aggies as the "father" of the Placement Office.

In the third inning, Longview collected three runs off three hits to take the lead and stay in command the rest of the way. Bryan scored in the sixth, the run unearned.

Al Kaiser paced Sports hitters, collecting two for four while short stop Johnny Brugga, sixth man among league hitters with 280, failed to hit in four trips to the plate.

Harry Young notched a nifty two-hitter while his Texan teammates hammered out 11 hits to give Longview a 5-1 victory in the finale.

Young went as far as the seventh without allowing a hit. Bill Fallon spoiled the no-hit bid by pounding out a double in the seventh. The Sports' low tally came in the ninth when George Shell doubled home Fallon, who had walked.

Texas Republican Denounces Court

Washington, June 7.—Rep. Ben Guill, Texas' only Republican congressman, denounced supreme court rulings on tidelands and racial discrimination yesterday in his first speech in the House.

He also blasted the "raw deal administration" and criticized the "misplaced loyalty" of Texas voters.

Guill called yesterday's supreme court rulings which gave primary title to the tidelands to the federal government, a billion dollar theft.

"Another decision of the supreme court in the Sweatt case struck a severe and damaging blow at the entire concept of states rights," said Guill.

"Mr. speaker, these decisions, following the infamous veto of the Kerr (natural gas) bill, represent calculated and aggressive steps by the raw deal administration against the state of Texas.

"As long as Texas continues to support in office their worst enemies, the socialists who call themselves democrats, they can expect to be stabbed in the back repeatedly as a reward for their misplaced loyalty."

Cadet Golfers Finished Low In SWC As Compared To Last Season's Team

(Editor's note: This is the sixth in the series of round-ups being written on A&M sports.)

The Cadet linkmen opened their 1950 golf campaign on March 8 against the Southwest Texas State Bobcats of San Marcos and emerged victorious on the Bryan Country Club course.

The four man team of Gene Darby, Monte Currie, J. C. Fletcher, and Tom Aitken had practiced long and hard at the beginning of the season under the able guidance of Gayther Nowell, well known golfing pro, who is manager of the Golf Shop at the Country Club and man-in-charge at the links.

The future looked bright for the four Aggies who would attempt to fill the shoes of Travis Bryan, Jr., Jack Barnett, Bart Halton, and Johnny Henry last year's team and long time mainstays around the golf course.

But two days after the victorious engagement with the San Marcos foursome, the Cadet golfers met the University of Houston Cougars on the same course and suffered defeat with Gene Darby winning the only match of the afternoon.

Darby played in the No. 1 position for the Farmers throughout the season. The senior civil engineering student from Pharr is the only family man on the team. He is a capable linkster who first got the feel of the clubs some ten years ago. His father, E. B. Darby, Sr. was in the class of '25 and is a top ranking amateur golfer.

For the third game of the 1950 campaign the Cadet linksters dropped Sam Houston State Teachers College golfers as Fletcher and Aitken were the two singles winners in SHSTC event.

Fletcher is the only sophomore on the team and shoots in the No. 3 spot. The 18-year-old native of San Antonio has spent three and one half years on the links. He has entered several tournaments and with his father won the "father-in-law" city tournament in San Antonio last year.

Currie Not Up to Expectations
Currie, a civil engineering major from Bryan, added his bit to this year's link team but didn't fair as well as expected. He was runner-up to Travis Bryan, Jr. in the Bryan Golf Tourney which the latter won by forfeit.

Completing the foursome is Tom Aitken, junior petroleum student from Dallas, who is 26 years old. Recently married, and a veteran of 30 months in the Air Force, he began playing the golf game in 1946.

Still in pre-conference play the Aggies again defeated the SHSTC team in a return match on the opponents home course. The next match was another return event. This time with the Bobcats of San Marcos and once again the Aggies were triumphant.

At this point A&M's pre-conference play had ended and the record of one loss in five starts was short lived. The Bears of Baylor edged the Cadet linkmen in the first conference match for each of the teams.

Guerra Makes Entrance
Tony Guerra made his initial appearance as second man on the team in the qualifying rounds at the start of the season, but soon after had suffered a severe attack

of ptomaine poisoning which kept him down for over a month. The 25 year old golfer is a junior physical education student from Mission.

After the Baylor match the Cadets were scheduled to meet the Longhorns. The Longhorn aggregation nipped the Cadets and went on to top the Southwest Conference crown for the second straight year.

Another defeat was in store for the Aggies as the galaxy of golfers ventured into the Arkansas hills. Arkansas University turned the tables again to leave the Cadets without a win in conference play.

Following this was another match with U of H. The Cougars avenged their earlier defeat blanking the Aggie foursome.

TCU Downs A&M
Back into conference play two days later the Cadets met TCU

on the Aggie home course, and again the Cadets were defeated.

Against the Mustangs of SMU the Aggies drew blood and then only a drop as they finished in a tie.

Returning from Dallas the Cadets journeyed to Houston for their engagement with the Rice Owls, who edged A&M by a half point.

The match with Rice closed out the conference schedule for the Aggies, but they lost two more of their encounters on the golf course.

Ablene Christian College and Texas Wesleyan College were the final opponents who defeated the Aggie team. Looking to the future Coach Nowell says that Johnny Barrett, San Antonio; Miller Houston, Texas; Billy Baker, Houston; and Malcolm Douglas, Pampa, are "the best crop of freshmen golfers in the history of A&M"

234 Register Ind. Management In Swimming Short Courses Set

Thursday was registration day for the swimming program sponsored by the College Station Recreation Council, and it seems that just about everybody wants to learn to swim. A total of 234 youngsters paid their fees and were assigned to classes, and it is probable that late comers will swell the total to about 250. The swimming program has been one of the most successful programs sponsored by the Recreation Council, and if this record breaking enrollment can be taken as a guide it is growing in popularity.

At the time of registration forty-one children were assigned to the class for novice beginners; ninety-nine to the classes for low beginners; twenty-four to the class for high beginners; twenty-five to the class for intermediates; fifteen to the class for high intermediates; and seventeen to the class for advanced swimmers. Twelve registered for instruction in diving.

The swimming classes are under the direction of Art Adamsen, the Aggie swimming coach. Emil Manaliga will assist with the swimming classes and will also give instruction in diving.

McCarthy Accusations Hit by State Department

Washington, June 7.—(AP)—Senator McCarthy loosed a new blast against the State Department yesterday and met a quick retort terming one of his main accusations "absolutely false."

McCarthy told the senate the FBI four years ago listed 124 Red agents, communists, sympathizers and suspects in the state department—and that he knows of "at least three" who still hold top posts in the department.

Less than two hours after McCarthy finished his speech in the senate, the state department countered with a statement asserting that the purported "FBI chart" mentioned by McCarthy was not an FBI document.

Referring to McCarthy's claim that three suspects are still in

key jobs, the department said: "That statement is absolutely false."

The department declared: "The senator based his charge upon the completely erroneous belief that the FBI prepared a chart which purportedly evaluated departmental personnel in terms of 'agents,' 'communists,' etc."

"1. No such chart was ever received by the department of state from the FBI.

"2. The Department of Justice has informed us that no such chart was ever prepared by the FBI.

"3. The chart in question was merely a preliminary working document prepared by one of the State Department's security officers as a basis for further investigation.

"4. No persons purportedly identified on the chart as communist agents, communists or the like are now employed by the department of state except those whose loyalty has since been thoroughly checked, evaluated and reviewed under the president's loyalty program."

State Department press officer Michael McDermott told newsmen that the chart was not based on proof of disloyalty but on accusations which were investigated under the security system.

Originally, in his speech, McCarthy had said the FBI notified the State Department on May 15, 1947, that it had data on Red suspects in the department.

However, McDermott, told reporters that the date on the so-called "working document" was blurred and that it was actually May 15, 1946.

McCarthy told the senate that two months after the FBI purportedly submitted its data to the State Department, the department had dropped only 18 of the 124 so-called suspects.

Miss Donna Kelley of Bryan was married Saturday evening to Fred E. Grothaus Jr. of San Antonio in a ceremony performed by Rev. T. M. Valenta in the garden of the Oaks.

Mrs. Maurine Kelley of Bryan and Don E. Kelley of El Centro, Colorado, are the bride's parents. Mrs. B. E. Grothaus of San Diego, California, and Fred E. Grothaus of San Antonio, are the groom's parents.

The bride graduated from Stephen F. Austin High School. She attended Sam Houston State Teachers College and is now a secretary in the Horticulture Department at A&M.

The groom is a senior Sanitation Engineering major and a graduate from the Austin High School. He served two years in Japan in World War II.

Marine Private Was Vet Warrior at 14

—When Marine Pfc. Lawrence R. Lambert of New York City tells of fighting Nazis and Fascists at the ripe old age of 14, many of his Marine buddies are a little skeptical but his is no idle boast.

Born and raised in Italy, Private Lambert participated in many Partisan sabotage activities including bridge blowing, sniping and small scale warfare, when Germans occupied that country.

Even though he was a native Italian and didn't enter the United States until 1946, Lambert is a fully naturalized citizen under United States law because his father came to this country in 1909 and became an American citizen before his son was eighteen.
