

## Texas Nine Begins NCAA Title Defense

Omaha, June 13.—(P)—Champion Texas will open its title defense in the 1950 NCAA Baseball Tournament Thursday night, a district tourney favorite.

The Texans will meet Rutgers at 6:30 p.m. (CST) in the first game of the eight team tournament. Wisconsin meets Colorado A&M in the second game of the double elimination tournament, at 8:30 p.m.

Other first round games will be Alaska vs. Bradley and Tufts vs. Washington State, at 6:30 and 8:30 p.m. Friday.

The tough University of Texas nine won 14 of 15 games in the Southwest Conference race this year.

It includes the same three pitchers who carried the club to an NCAA title last June—Murray Wall, Charley Gorin and Jim Ehrler. Combined they gave up only 22 earned runs in conference competition.

Washington State and Wisconsin are the other strong teams in the tournament. Washington State has two undefeated pitchers on its roster—Lee Dolquist and Russ Foster. A third Washington State hurler, Gene Conley with a record of two and two is attracting wide interest from major league scouts.

Wisconsin's conquest of the Big Ten makes the Badgers a powerful threat.

## Scheduled Sunday Night Ball Game Cancelled

ST. LOUIS, June 13.—(P)—The controversial Sunday night baseball game scheduled for July 18 between St. Louis and Brooklyn was called off yesterday by President Fred M. Saigh of the Cardinals.

Saigh said his action was based "entirely" on a ruling by National League President Ford Frick and Louis Carroll, league counsel, that the game would violate league regulations.

"There were no other considerations," Saigh said.

Commissioner A. B. Chandler ordered Saigh to cancel preparations for the game saying it would conflict with church services. The commissioner said this would note be in the best interest of baseball.

Saigh disagreed and asked for a hearing. Preparations for the game went on.

Saigh received Carroll's interpretation of the league rule yesterday. The rule reads: "No night game shall be scheduled on a get-away date without the consent of the visiting team, or on Sunday."

## Ag Swimmers Won 4, Lost 2, Placed 3rd In Conference

The Aggie Swimming team, composed mostly of sophomores, came through the 1949-50 season with a record of 4 wins, 2 losses, and a third place in the Conference swimming meet. This was the first time that A&M had come in lower than second in the Conference since 1934.

A&M's team was built around 4 sophomores—Bill Sargent, backstroke; Van Adamson, freestyle; Ralph Ellis, freestyle; and Bill Karow, a breaststroker and received support from point getters Tommy Comstock, John Parnell, Dan Blondell, Howell Johnson, and Tommie Butler.

The Cadets under the leadership of Coach Art Adamson, started off the season byopping second spot in the SWC relay tank meet, just 1 pound behind powerful Texas University.

In their first dual meet with U.U., the Aggies suffered a defeat of 46 to 35, but handed O.U.'s 400 freestyle relay team their first defeat in three years of competition.

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## Cardinals Sign Moon For Buffs

Wally Moon has turned pro. Moon, who was chosen to the all-SWC and the District 6 NCAA baseball teams, has signed with the St. Louis Cardinals and will be farmed at Houston with the Buffs.

Coach Marty Karow, baseball and basketball tutor of the Aggies, said that although the loss would be great, Moon could be replaced in the centerfield. Hollis Baker can surely field as well as Moon, Karow added, but we will miss his power.

Moon had lettered for two straight seasons in basketball and baseball for A&M. He would have been a senior next season and still had a year of eligibility in both sports.

Commenting on the signing of Moon by the professional club, Karow, said "I am getting irritated at the scouts who sign the boys before they have completed their eligibility, and although there is nothing to prevent them from signing down the boys early, I still don't like it."
