Representing College Station at the annual Girl's State gathering in Austin this week will be Dorothy Bates, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. C. H. Bates and Ann Southern whose parents are Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Southern. Both girls were selected as outstanding junior girls in Consolidated High School and deemed worthy of the honor by members of the high school faculty in a special vote taken last month.

Sponsoring the girls trip to the meeting will be the Campus Study Club and the College Station Kiwanis Club. The meeting is sponsored by the American Legion Women Auxiliary yearly, as the local girls were accepted through applications from this organization.

This marks the first time that any girl from College Station has attended the meeting which is held at the Texas State School for the Blind in Austin.

"Training for citizenship" is the theme of the meet, and opportuni-

ties for instruction and experience along these lines will be made possible when the girls organize into two political groups for the election of city, county, and state officials. They will be allowed to hold honorary position for one day as they see how the various departments and offices of our state government are run.

Governor Allen Shivers will speak to the group along with several other distinguished leaders in the Capital at Austin.

Selection of the two girls was made according to leadership, character, courage, honesty, scholarship, and cooperativeness. Their willingness to be of service to their community and school was also a major factor in the selection.

The meeting will last from June 14-20 inclusive.

LEGAL
ORDINANCE NO. 144
An ordinance making it unlawful to discharge any firearm within the limits of the City defining firearms, and providing a penalty.
BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF COLLEGE STATION:
1. It shall be unlawful to shoot a firearm within the limits of the city.
2. A firearm shall include specifically but not exclusively any shotgun, pistol, rifle, air rifle, B. B. gun or any other mechanism that discharges or shoots any bullet, projectile, or any other missile of any size by force of combustion, mechanism or air.
3. Anyone violating this ordinance shall be guilty of misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined not less than \$25.00, nor more than \$50.00, or \$50.00 dollars.
