

# Pee Wee, Jr., Sr. Softball Teams Need More Players

Coaches of the Pee Wee, Junior, and Senior softball divisions of the city recreation program announced yesterday they need more players.

Pee Wee Softball is in dire need of new members, said Othel Chafin, coach. Pee Wee Softball meets at 8 a. m. in College Hills on Mondays and Thursdays, and at 8 a. m. at A&M Consolidated on Tuesdays and Fridays.

**Short on Players**

"So far the youngsters have only pitched and held catching practices since there are not enough players to make-up two full teams," Chafin said. Age for the Pee Wee players is from six to ten years.

Junior Softball numbers close to 25 players from 10 to 14 years of age inclusive, according to Taylor Wilkins, coach for the junior division. No league is organized in this division, although there is a representative team for College Station that plays games with other cities' teams.

Only games scheduled for the junior team so far with Navasota and Madisonville, Wilkins said.

**Juniors Have 25**

The Junior division numbers approximately 25 players. This group meets on the lighted softball field at 5:30 p. m. on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays, said Wilkins.

A n'y boy from College Station between the ages of 10 and 14 is welcomed to attend any of the practice sessions, Wilkins added.

The group director also announced that a schedule is to be worked out as soon as most of the players return from Boy Scout camp.

The Senior division is the only group of the three that has any league, or group of teams.

**Six Senior Teams**

Six clubs are signed in the senior division, each club numbering approximately 15 players, according to J. Gordon Gay, of the committee in charge of senior softball.

Each team has a player-manager who schedules the practice sessions and runs the club. The six teams are made-up of men over sixteen, added Gay.

Selection and assignment to a team is made by Gay who said all a candidate need do is phone him at the YMCA and ask to be placed on one of the team rosters. The teams receive their new players by rotation, Gay added.

**Married Students Eligible**

Any men from College Station, including married students who are not eligible to participate in any of the college intramural programs are welcomed, he said.

All of the senior division games are played either in College Hills or at College Park. The teams started play June 7, said Gay and will continue to play on through August 18.

Names of the teams and their managers are Giants, A. W. Gould; Cubs, Bill Hill; Tigers, J. Rogers; Pirates, Andy Salis; Yankees, N. Anderson; and Indians, Hank Mills.

W. R. Horsley umpires all of the College Hills games, and Gay officiates the College Park games.

According to the rules set by the softball committee no spikes may be worn in the league and the runner may steal home or second on a wild pitch.

Each team manager is given two practice balls, one mask, and three bats. Gay added that they are planning to use a new ball which is supposed to last over 100 innings and after that time can be re-covered and re-used.

New masks and bats have been purchased for the senior division. Masks, said Gay, are aluminum and should prove to be comfortable and serviceable.

Three triple headers are scheduled at the community pines on June 20, July 12, and August 17, Gay added.

"Everyone who goes out might have a chance to play, but preference will be given to those who have attended practice," Gay said.

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Staying at home are Mrs. A. R. Orr and Mrs. Eugene Rush who teach history in high school and English in junior high, respectively.

Three teachers are conducting special classes for the summer. Mrs. Velma Matthews, home economics teacher, is working with high school girls on home projects while Mrs. Anne Barnes is teaching Mathematics to special students at A&M. Colonel Richard Dunn, the bandmaster, will have special classes in music for students and adults during the summer.

Superintendent Les Richardson offered the names and summer occupations of twenty-nine teachers in the high school and grade school at Consolidated. It was interesting to note that of the high school teachers, which number nineteen, only two are planning to stay home and occupy themselves with being housewives; the others have scheduled various occupations.

Mrs. S. S. Sorenson, who teaches history at Consolidated High, is the only teacher working for a PhD degree. She is attending the University of Texas. Lloyd Bone, high school principal and Jim Bevans, junior high coach, are working on their master's degree at A&M.

Also working for master's degrees are Mrs. Louise Glenn, high school business teacher, and Mrs. J. T. Duncan, high school English teacher. They are at the University of Texas.
