Food Group President Gives Tips on Cooking Concoctions

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1 cup sliced mushrooms (save every drop of juice)

1 1/4 tsp. mornostare mustard

1 1/4 tsp. worstershire sauce

2 tsp. dried or chopped fresh parsley

2 tsp. sherry wine

1 chopped or sliced pimento

1 cup cream sauce and when thickened add the mustard, worstershire sauce, and the juice from canned mushrooms. Stir gently until well blended. Take from fire and add all other ingredients, except the crab meat.

Here is her secret touch. Let the crab meat soak in the wine, to which a few drops of fresh lemon juice has been added for at least an hour. Add wine-soaked crab meat to sauce just before serving.

Avacado-Onion Appetizer

Since we are having a luncheon, Mrs. Stevenson suggests this avacado-onion appetizer. Arrange nests of curly rye on salad plates. Place a chilled avacado half on each plate. Drizzle lemon juice over this with about 1 teaspoon for each serving. Fill the avacado center with tiny pickled onions and add one teaspoon French dressing. Top this with stuffed olives, and serve ice cold with small pretzels oven-hot.
