**Fudge Bar Specialty**  
It is in her kitchen that Mrs.

1 cup sliced mushrooms  
(save every drop of juice)  
1 1/2 tsp. marmalade mustard  
1 1/4 tsp. worcestershire sauce  
2 tsp. dried or chopped fresh parsley

1 2/3 cup sherry wine  
1 1/2 cup cocoa  
1 1/2 cup water  
2 2/3 cup shortening (melted)  
1 1/2 cups sugar  
1 tsp. salt  
1 tsp. baking powder  
3 eggs

1 cup sifted cake flour  
1 cup nut meats

Beat the eggs add sugar and stir in cocoa paste (make paste of cocoa and water) and melted shortening. Add sifted flour, salt, and baking powder. Add vanilla and nuts and bake at 350 degrees for about 40 minutes.
