Cadet James Boatner, son of Commandant and Mrs. H. L. Boatner, has been selected along with 23 of his West Point classmates to make an educational trip this summer to Gen. MacArthur's Far Eastern Command.

The trip, a part of the educational program of the United States Military Academy, will take the group to Guam, Japan, Okinawa, and the Philippines.

The West Pointers will see first hand, the social, economic, and political problems facing these lands. Particular attention will be paid to the problems encountered by the Army, Navy, and Air Force in the Far East, including occupation forces and military government in Japan and Okinawa.

ORDINANCE NO. 142 AN ORDINANCE REGRADING REGISTRATION FOR CUTTING AND TAKING ORDERS OR SUBSCRIPTIONS FOR OUT-OF-STATE BOOKS AND PUBLICATIONS PRESCRIBING METHODS OF REGISTRATION AND PROCEDURE. PUBLISHED

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF COLLEGE STATION, TEXAS:

No person unless he has registered for that purpose shall make or take an order or subscription within the City for any merchandise, photographs, newspapers, magazines or other items or services which at the time such sold or received in or for the purpose of sale or service is taken or located in another state or will be produced in another state and shipped or otherwise sent into this City in the fulfillment of such order or request.

2 Registering for above purpose shall consist of the following:

(a) Filling out a form provided by the City Secretary giving the following information:

1. Name, home address and legal address if any of registrant.

2. Name and address of the person whom or to whom the order or service is taken or located in another state or will be produced in another state and shipped or otherwise sent into this City.

3. Nature of the articles or things which are to be sold or for which orders are to be solicited.

4. Whether registrant, upon any sale or order, shall demand or receive or accept payment or deposit of any money in advance of final delivery.

5. Period of time which registrant expects to submit or sell in said City.

(b) Presenting satisfactory written or documentary evidence of the registrant's identity.

Any person violating this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction be fined not less than \$10.00 dollars nor more than one hundred (\$100.00) dollars.
