Supreme Court majority mail carrier admitted to the Uni-Daniel's speech was broadcast

The attorney general re-stated his belief that the supreme court evidence could be presented "as is done in other law suits.

"On June 5, every member of either recognized or assumed ownership of these lands by the Republic of Texas," Daniel said.

"However, the majority said that despite this ownership and the provision retaining unsold lands to the state of Texas, there was another section of the annexation agreement which caused these particular lands to pass to the United States.

"Mr. Justice Douglas, writing for the majority, said that the controlling provision in the agree ment was that Texas was to enter the United States 'on equal footing with the existing states'. Since the original states had been held in the California case not to own their tidelands, Mr. Justice Douglas reasoned that Texas could

"In support thereof, Mr. Justice Douglas quoted an footing' provision contained in a rejected section of the joint resolution adopted by the States Congress on March 1, 1845, is any indication.
