

TU Nine Repeating Last Year's Feat

Defending NCAA baseball champion Texas University is doing it again. That is, TU is back on the road towards winning the title which it ran away with last year.

A win tonight over Rutgers would send the Longhorns into the finale tomorrow night with Washington State. The Longhorns now have a 3-1 record in the meet. After their Tuesday night trouncing of the Washington State Cougars, hitherto unbeaten in tournament play, the Steers should win the meet if they are victorious again tonight.

The SWC champion received a jolt in its opening game when Rutgers staged an eighth inning, three-run rally to win, 4-2. In their second game the Texans eliminated Colorado A&M from the tournament, 3-1, then continued their winning streak by shutting-out Tufts, 7-0, for their second win.

Rightfielder Cuss Hrcir led the Texas hitters in their first three games, gaining six hits in eight trips to the plate for a .750 percentage.

As a team, the Orange and White hit a .287 clip while their opponents in the first three games hit .172.

Other hitters on the Longhorn nine include Bob Brock, .378; Stu Benson, .300; Kai Segrist, .278; Ben Tompkins, .308; and Frank Kana, .222. The three Texas pitchers Charles Gorin, and Jim Ehrler, failed to connect in the initial three games.

Frank Womack's only hit was a 370 homer in the first game with Hrcir aboard. The only other circuit clot in the Texans games was by Kai Segrist in the fifth inning Tuesday night against the Cougars with two on base.

Although the TU hurlers have failed to hit, they have pitched outstanding ball in the game against Rutgers. Wall struck out six, gave up four bases-on-balls, and was tapped for four runs, off six hits.

Harris Upsets Shea In NCAA Net Tourny

Austin, Tex., June 22—(AP)—Two upsets—one of them minor—trimmed the number of seeded singles players to five in the fourth round of the NCAA Tennis Tournament yesterday. Rain cancelled the second round of doubles.

UCLA will hold a dominating position in singles quarterfinals today. Three of its four entries—two among the four top-seeded players—scored victories yesterday.

For the University of Southern California it was a disastrous day. Southern Cal entered the fourth round with four men still in, but when the last volley was fired, only one remained.

That was Earl Coehell. He might be all Southern Cal needs. Seeded third, he is a co-favorite with Herb Flam of UCLA to lift the championship from Jack Turo of Tulane. The draw placed Coehell and Flam in the same bracket so if they meet, it will have to be in the semifinals.

Harris Upsets Shea

Chick Harris of Rice Institute manufactured the tournament's biggest surprise thus far by eliminating eighth-seeded Gilbert Shea of Southern California, 3-6, 6-4, 6-3.

Interrupted by the rain when he had Jack Shoemaker of UCLA down, 6-0, 4-0, Coehell clowned and dropped two games when they returned to the soggy courts in the afternoon. Then he got serious and ended the match quickly. The final score: 6-0, 6-2.

Flam was equally impressive as he slashed to a 6-2, 6-0 victory over Ken Crawford of SMU, the Southwest Conference champion.

Glenn Bassett, the UCLA dark horse, rallied strongly to defeat Jack Teal of Southern Cal 5-7, 6-2, 6-3.

Cancellation of yesterday's doubles will require two rounds of doubles today in addition to the quarterfinals round in singles. Further rain would seriously disrupt the schedule, which calls for singles finals to be played Saturday morning and doubles finals that afternoon.

St. Louis Browns Need More Support

St. Louis, June 22—(AP)—A renewed plea for better support of the St. Louis Browns by fans here revived talk yesterday the club may eventually be moved to another city.

Bill DeWitt, president of the club, said as much himself. But he insisted no deal is on the fire at this time.

"We don't want to move out of St. Louis," DeWitt told the St. Louis Advertising Club. "But we may have to some day unless we receive better support."

Later DeWitt disclosed that "reliable people" from six different cities have inquired during the past several months about the possibility of buying the Browns.

He would not identify the persons or groups, but said the feelers came from Baltimore, Milwaukee, Los Angeles, Kansas City, Houston and Dallas.

R. W. Burnett, owner of the Dallas Eagles, told newsmen in that city that he would be a bidder if the Browns are placed on the market. "I wouldn't exactly say that I have made an offer for the Browns but Bill DeWitt knows that I am interested, since I have made that fact known before," Burnett said.

Cardinals Win, Tie for First; Indians Defeat Yankees' 5-1

New York, June 22—(AP)—The St. Louis Cardinals ran up the biggest score against the Giants since opening day as they crushed the New Yorkers, 14-0, yesterday to move into a first place tie with the Brooklyn Dodgers.

Manager Eddie Dyer's Red Birds pounded five Giant pitchers for 17 hits. The loss snapped a four game Cardinal losing streak.

The Card blows included only three extra base wallops, a double

by Red Schoendienst and triples by Johnny Lindell and Rice. In their previous four games all of the Cards' runs came as a result of homers.

Knuckleballer Kirby Higbe made his first start of the year for the Giants and lasted less than two innings.

Max Lanier started for the Cardinals and after yielding single runs in the first and third innings, left in favor of Gerry Staley in the fifth after allowing two more runs. Staley granted the Giants three hits over the remaining five rounds and received credit for his sixth victory.

Whitey Lockman continued his hot batting pace for the Giants, Lockman collected three of the Giant's nine hits and now has banged out 15 safeties in his last four games.

gave Pittsburgh a 5-3 victory over the Philadelphia Phillies in the second game of the series last night.

Boston, June 22—(AP)—The Chicago Cubs got only five men on base last night but three of them scored to whip Boston's Braves 3-0 as Lefty Johnny Schmitz registered his third shutout of the season. Vern Bickford gave only five hits. The victory gave the Cubs a sweep of the two game series.

Detroit, June 22—(AP)—The Washington Senators pounded out their second straight win over the American League leading Detroit Tigers as they posted a 12 to 4 decision yesterday behind the five-hit pitching of Sandolfo Conesera.

Cleveland, June 22—(AP)—A ninth inning home run by Bobby Brown deprived righthander Early Wynn of a shutout yesterday as

the Cleveland Indians defeated the New York Yankees, 5-1, before a crowd of 14,737.

Wynn allowed only four hits in gaining his fifth victory against four losses. He had a no-hitter until his mound opponent Vic Raschi, singled with one out in the sixth inning.

The loss was Raschi's fourth against eight victories. The result squared the series between the two teams at one game apiece. It was the Indians' first triumph of the season over the Yankees on their home grounds.

Raschi allowed only three hits before being removed for a pinch hitter in the eighth inning.

Wynn's tightest moment came in the New York eighth when he lost control and loaded the bases on passes to Gene Woodling and pinch hitters Bill Johnson and Johnny Mize. There was only one out but Joe DiMaggio bounced back to the mound for a pitcher-catcher-first base double play to end the threat.
