Street Markers To Be Erected By City Council

House numbers, street sign posts, and the names of a few streets will undergo a big change in College Station within the next few months, announced Mayor Ernest Langford.

With this renovation of the street and house markers, the city council hopes to gain a more systematic plan of identifying houses and streets of the community, the mayor said.

Two concrete street signs are planned to be set up at all intersections with the street name, block numbers, and designation as to what section of town the street is in—east, west, north or south, Mayor Langford added.

The posts, which are to stand four feet out of the ground, will be painted with reflector paint so the name of the street may be easily read by persons driving at night.

One of the major troubles of the present street marker system, he said, is that they are too high above the ground for the beam of light from a passing car to strike. The new low signs will afford easier reading, especially with the reflector painted lettering, the mayor announced.

All streets presently without names will be named and some names will be changed to correspond with the numbering system, Mayor Langford said.

Covering the back porch the pink blossomed coral vine can be seen; more proof of Mrs. Nelson's hobby.

Arranging the flowers is an art at which she also excels. She has been the president of the Garden Club this year which is indication that her hobby is respected and her ability recognized.

At the annual flower show, put on by the Garden Club, her delphinium arrangement won a purple ribbon, which is excellent rating.

College Station has one of the best competitive teams in the state, having won state titles several times in both AAU and YAAF meets. Last year the junior swimming division won the Junior Olympics held in Houston. They competed against teams from all over the nation, Adamson said.

A good season is expected for this summer, although Adamson said the women's and men's senior groups might be somewhat weak. The majority of senior swimmers work out at night, whereas the junior swimmers practice in the afternoon, the coach added.

LEGAL

ORDINANCE NO. 145

AN ORDINANCE REQUIRING REGISTRATION FOR SOLICITING AND TAKING ORDERS FOR SUBSCRIPTIONS FOR CITY OF STATE GOODS AND PUBLICATIONS PRESCRIBING METHOD OF REGISTRATION AND PROVIDING A PENALTY

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF COLLEGE STATION TEXAS

No person unless he has registered for such purpose shall solicit or take an order or subscription within the City for any merchandise, photographs, newspapers, magazines, or other items or services which at the time such solicitation is made or such order or subscription is taken are located in another state or will be prepared in another state and shipped or otherwise sent into this City in the fulfillment of such order or subscription.

Registering for above purpose shall consist of the following:

- Filing out a form provided by the City Secretary giving the following information:
 - Name, home address and local address, if any, of registrant.
 - Name and address of the person firm or corporation, if any, that he or she represents or for whom or through whom orders are to be solicited or desired.
 - Nature of the articles or things which are to be sold or for which orders are to be solicited.
 - Whether registrant upon any sale of such order shall demand or receive or accept payment or deposit of money in advance of final delivery.
 - Period of time which registrant expects to solicit or sell in said city.
- Submitting satisfactory written or documentary evidence of the registrant's identity.
- Any person violating this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be punished by a fine of not more than \$10.00, or by imprisonment for not more than one hundred (100) days. Passed approved and ordered published this 12th day of June 1950 A. D.
