Editors Expect July Delivery For Consolidated 'Tigerland'

This year's Tigerland '50 being published by the students of A&M Consolidated High School, tells the story of the 106 high school students for the 1949-50 school year. Delivery of the annual will be about the twentieth of July.
One hundred copies of this year's mason-bound edition have been ordered, and approximately eighty orders, have been sold. The rest of the books will be placed on sale when they arrive.
So that all of the students may get their "Tigerland" together, and exchange the other customary salutations commonly written in yearbooks, there will be a "Yearbook Party" next month when the annuals are delivered.
Hildebrand is Editor
But in order that everyone may

have a preview of what the Tigerland '50 brings to its readers, Editor-in-Chief John Hildebrand, has given a few statements telling about the 111 page edition.
Three other graduating seniors besides Hildebrand are among those persons who made the Tigerland '50 a reality. They are Literary Editor Frances Simek, Layout Editor Betty O'Bannon, and Gemma Dobrovinsky, business manager.
Five other students, of which three were juniors last year and two sophomores, complete the list of persons who gave their time and talent toward publishing the Tigerland. They are Assistant Editor Dick Weick, Sports Editor Jack Bureharil, and Elizabeth Miller, the assistant Literary Editor.
The two sophomore members of the Tigerland Staff are Society Editor Judy Oden and Photographer Sara Puddy who took many of the snapshots and informal pictures for the book.
Assists Students
Lending her assistance to the students as the faculty advisor is Mrs. Marial Orr, mathematics teacher.
Work was started in gathering the material which is embodied in the seven sections of the book at the beginning of school last September. Each of the seven sections has a full-page picture introductory page.
The dedication of the annual is to the School Board.
Following the dedication is the faculty members section whose pictures are placed six to a page. The senior pictures are also six to a page, and each senior has a list of his or her activities following the picture. The class of 1950 had twenty graduating seniors.
All of the classes have individual pictures, the underclassmen all having eight pictures per page. Introducing each of the classes is a full-page picture of the class officers. One page has also

been set aside for the junior high students.
Sports Section
There are several pages allotted to the sports section of the "Tigerland." The football, basketball, and baseball activities have both group and individual pictures. The only game pictures are of football and basketball.
Six more pages have been assigned to the all-school favorites, and the senior, junior, sophomore, and freshman favorites. Other pages have pictures of the commencement exercises, senior plays, dances, Senior Day and other informal snapshots.
Of the 111 pages in the "Tigerland" only fifteen are devoted to advertising. The advertising was sold by members from each class, although the girls got the upper hand and sold the most.
The Tigerland '50 sells for two dollars and a half, and was printed by the Taylor Publishing Company of Dallas.

LEGAL

ORDINANCE NO. 145
AN ORDINANCE REQUIRING REGISTRATION FOR SELLING AND TAKING ORDERS OR SUBSCRIPTIONS FOR OUT-OF-STATE GOODS AND PUBLICATIONS PUBLISHING MONTHLY OR QUARTERLY AND PROVIDING A PENALTY BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF COLLEGE STATION TEXAS:

1. No person unless he has registered for that purpose shall solicit or take an order or subscription within the City for any merchandise, photographs, newspapers, magazines, or other items or services which at the time such solicitation is made of such order or subscription is taken are located in another state or will be produced in another state and shipped or otherwise sent into this City in the fulfillment of such order or subscription.
2. Registering for above purpose shall consist of the following:
 - (a) Filling out a form provided by the City Secretary giving the following information:
 1. Name, home address and local address.
 2. Name and address of the person firm or corporation, if any that he or she represents or for whom or through which orders are to be solicited or cleared.
 3. Nature of the articles or things which are to be sold or for which orders are to be solicited.
 4. Whether registrant, upon any sale or order shall demand or receive or accept payment or deposit of money in advance of final delivery.
 5. Period of time which registrant expects to solicit or sell in said City.
 - (b) Furnishing satisfactory written or documentary evidence of the registrant's identity.
3. Any person violating this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$50 (Fifty) dollars nor more than one hundred (\$100.00) dollars. Penalties approved and ordered published this 12th day of June, 1950; A. D.
