

# Dorm 14, Geologists Continue To Lead

# TU's Williams Upset in NCAA Golf Tourney

Albuquerque, N. M., June 29 (AP)—It took sub-par golf and extra hole stamina to shine in the first round match play in the NCAA tournament yesterday.

A prime example was the 2 and 1 upset victory of Len Kennett, big University of Southern California blond, over Morris Williams, Jr., highly regarded Texas University shooter.

Kennett was a stroke under par at 66 for the 17 holes while Williams had a 69. One over par scores by Williams on No. 2 and No. 6 and birdies by Kennett on Nos. 5 and 7 put the Californian four up at the turn. Williams rallied to win the 14th and 15th holes but lost the match when they halved Nos. 16 and 17.

Except for a couple of lesser from reversals, favorites generally triumphed in contests.

Match play in the third annual National Collegiate Athletic Association meet started yesterday among 64 qualifiers from an original field of 145. The championship will be decided Saturday. Matches are being played over the 6,813-yard University of New Mexico course, a par 35-37-72 layout.

Dennis Sharpest Shooter

From a medal standpoint, the day's sharpest shooting came from Dave Dennis, 23-year-old Kansas University senior and newly crowned Kansas amateur title. After besting Oklahoma's Jim Vickers 5 and 4, he went on to finish the round with a five-under-par 67. Vickers, conqueror of Toledo's Frank Stranahan in the recent western amateur at Dallas, took a 72.

Favorites generally advanced, including touring medalist Arnold Palmer of Wake Forest and defending champion Harris Ward, Jr., of North Carolina.

Maxwell of NTSC Wins

One of the hottest contests in which a four-under-par 65 wasn't good enough to win—65 long driving—Bill Maxwell of North Texas State out Nevada's Wayne Adams on the 19th green. Each carded a 68 for the regular distance, and Maxwell birdied the extra hole while Adams required a par.

# Rizzuto Holds Wide Lead Over Stephens

Chicago, June 29—AP—Phil Rizzuto of the New York Yankees yesterday gained a wide lead over Brooklyn's Vern Stephens in the run for starting American League shortstop in the 17th all-star game here July 11.

Heavy balloting in New York enabled Rizzuto to pull away from the Red Sox star by 64,875 votes. The diminutive Yankee infielder's total soared to 606,323 compared to 542,448 for Stephens.

The total vote in the National Poll, which ends at midnight Saturday, rose to 2,611,497.

The New York returns also boosted Roy Campanella, Brooklyn's catcher, to the top spot in the National League, with 561,327.

Larry "Yogi" Berra, Yankee catcher, holds an advantage of 60,277 votes over Birdie Topham of the Red Sox, due principally to New York's heavy support,
