

Truman Made All Decisions On Korean Situation Himself

Washington, June 29—AP—The "inside story" behind President Truman's historic decision in the Korean war crisis came out yesterday, with officials emphasizing these points:

1. In a solemn talk with his top diplomatic-defense leaders Sunday, the president insisted that the United States had to "draw the line" against Communism.

2. The president said the United States would "lose face" with democratic nations everywhere if it failed to stand behind the little South Korea republic it sponsored.

Decisions in every case were made and laid down by Mr. Truman himself.

Other officials said the president made a decision to move against Communist forces in the Far East before he arrived in Washington Sunday from an interrupted weekend in Missouri.

On this, there is agreement, both from members of his staff and those who sat in on the fateful Blair house sessions Sunday and Monday night.

Mr. Truman himself gave no inkling that he intended to move until after his return to Washington.

Certainly he did not appear to have made up his mind just before he stepped aboard his plane, the "Independence," at Kansas

City for the race back to the capital.

But one of his first remarks at Blair house Sunday night was that the Communist tactics in the Far East could no longer be ignored.

"Vigorous Action"

Then, having determined upon "vigorous action," the president sought both military and diplomatic recommendations on how to proceed.

He was given intelligence reports. Secretary of Defense Johnson, just back from Tokyo Saturday from conferences with General Douglas MacArthur, brought along a memorandum from the general urging a mission to Formosa.

Made by Truman
As Secretary of Defense Johnson and Secretary of State Acheson recalled events today, the de-

Club Founder Spends Much Time Lecturing, Judging

Mrs. C. B. Campbell, one of the founders of the A&M Garden Club, has been interested in horticulture and flower arranging all of her life. Today, as an accredited state judge of the state garden clubs, and as an active worker in the A&M Garden Club, she acts as a lecturer and advisor in flower arranging on local and statewide projects.

She believes that the garden clubs are the most active and worthwhile organizations we have, since wherever there is a garden club, there are more attractive homes and parks.

A garden club starts an interest that is almost catching, by interesting other people in flowers and beautification of property," she says. Sixteen years ago, when the A&M Garden Club was organized, garden club work in Texas was just beginning. Today, there are 150 clubs, with more horticulturists and garden show workers than any other state, she informed us.

Special Projects

The A&M Garden Club has several projects each year. At the present time there is a five year plan to beautify the College Station cemetery. Several unsightly spots around the city have been cleaned up by the club members. The gardeners helped landscape the school yard at Consolidated and in cooperation with the State Highway Department planted shrubs along Highway 6, between Bryan and College Station.

Leading all other states in the number of garden clubs, Texas even has some active organizations in towns of population under 500.

Another branch of garden club work is flower arranging. Mrs. Campbell says that there are two main arrangements for flowers, the mass arrangement and the line arrangement. With the mass arrangement most of the design is composed of flowers, whereas the line arrangement's success depends upon simplicity and design.

• LEGAL •

ORDINANCE NO. 145

AN ORDINANCE REQUIRING REGISTRATION FOR SOLICITING AND TAKING ORDERS OR SUBSCRIPTIONS FOR OUT-OF-STATE GOODS AND PUBLICATIONS, PRESCRIBING METHOD OF REGISTRATION AND PROVIDING A PENALTY THEREFOR.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF COLLEGE STATION, TEXAS:

1. No person unless he has registered for that purpose shall solicit or take an order or subscription within the City for any merchandise, photographs, newspapers, magazines or other items or services which at the time such solicitation is made or such order or subscription is taken are located in another state or will be produced in another state and shipped or otherwise sent into this City in the fulfillment of such order or subscription.

2. Registering for above purpose shall consist of the following:

(a) Filing out a form provided by the City Secretary giving the following information:

1. Name, home address and local address if any of registrant.
2. Name and address of the person from or for whom the order or subscription is to be solicited or cleared.
3. Nature of the articles or things which are to be sold or for which orders are to be solicited.
4. Whether registrant upon sale or order shall demand or receive advance payment or deposit of money in advance of final delivery.
5. Period of time which registrant expects to solicit or sell in said City.

(b) Furnishing satisfactory written or documentary evidence of the registrant's identity.

3. Any person violating this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$50 (\$100.00) dollars nor more than one hundred (\$100.00) dollars, plus costs, and shall be ordered to pay the fine 17th day of June, 1950. A. S.

Communist Paper Hits 'Aggression'

Moscow, June 29—AP—Pravda, the Communist party paper, asserted yesterday the United States "has undertaken a direct act of aggression" against North Korea and Communist China.

In a front page editorial, it declared President Truman's order to ships and planes to help western-recognized Southern Korea and Formosa was "evidence that the American ruling circles no longer confine themselves to the preparations for aggression, but have gone over to direct acts of aggression."

Then it inquired: "Have they not, however, gone too far?"

It gave no answer.

Note Delivered

The U. S. Embassy said a note from Washington asking Russia to use its influence to bring about the withdrawal of the invading Communist forces from South Korea was delivered Tuesday. No reaction was made public.

Pravda's editorial was the first public Russian comment on the new U. S. policy in the Pacific strife. President Truman's statement was reported in routine fashion.

Pravda published the story on page three, four paragraphs, Lavetia, the Soviet government organ, printed it on the back page, as did Red Star and Red Fleet, papers of the army and navy. Pravda was the only one to comment. Diplomats here thought it highly significant that the reaction came so swiftly. Normally, it takes several days.

"Trampling U. N. Charter"

"The American government, with its characteristic unceremoniousness as regards international law, is grossly trampling on the United Nations charter, acting as though the United Nations organization did not exist at all," the Pravda editorial asserted.

"The question arises, who authorized the American government to take this step? In bringing its armed forces into action, did the United States government reach agreement on its policy with the United Nations organization, about their loyalty to which Truman and (Secretary of State) Acheson are so vociferous; where and when did the Security Council make a decision giving the hands of the United States of America in the acts of direct aggression undertaken by it?"

"Openly Aggressive"

"In undertaking its openly aggressive act," Pravda concluded, "the American government evidently set itself the aim of confronting the United Nations organization with a 'fait accompli.'" (accomplished fact.)

The editorial repeated previous Soviet declarations that "the provocative actions of troops of the puppet government of South Korea directed against the Korean people's democratic republic (Northern Korea) unleashed military operations on the territory of Korea."
