John Paber, superintendent of recreation for the Tyler parks and recreation department said that the meet would be the biggest and most competitive in its history.

Coach Art Adamson explained that although the local aggregation was not altogether the strongest team entered in the meet, it is a well rounded club and should prove effective enough to place high.

So far this season, the College Station swimming team has won its own meet, and the male portion of the squad took second in the recent YMCA meet in Houston.

Draft To Rob Texas Nines Of Material

Baseball boomed in Texas from 1946 until 1950. It's doubtful if the trend will continue next year. Wiseguys thought economic conditions would burst Texas' baseball bubble. But it looks like the uncertain international situation will do it instead.

It's highly doubtful if the little leagues of Texas—and the nation—can keep going if their prime source of material is cut off—the raw rookies.

Use of the draft to fill the ranks of the U. S.' armed forces may very well dry up this flow of material. If any goodly number of 19 to 26 are called into service, it's a good bet that some of the Class D and C clubs are going on the rocks.

Law Calls for Rookies

Baseball law calls for a certain number of Rookies, limited servicemen and veterans on leagues of Class C and D, and these leagues are the bulk of U. S. baseball.

It would take a general "draft" of manpower, probably to force such leagues as the Class AA Texas to suspend operations. That's what it took during World War II.

Right now you'll find few baseball men willing to comment on prospects for a decrease in the number of Texas baseball leagues next year. Most prefer a "wait and see attitude."

But it is hard to believe that there won't be—if your high school and sandlot players go into service, instead of organized baseball.

The Tigers did all of their scoring before Masterson was replaced by Chuck Stobbs with none out in the fourth.

Boswell Wins Blind Golf Tourney, Again
Augusta, Me., July 21—(AP)—Defending champion Charlie Boswell won the American Blind Golf Tournament again yesterday with a 36-hole total of 220.

The Birmingham, Ala., golfer was seven strokes ahead of his nearest two competitors, who tied for second place. They were Art Smith of Philadelphia and Maine's lone entrant, Bill Gilman of Portland. Each posted a 227 for the two days of medal play at the 6,015 yard Augusta Country Club course.

Texas Pro Baseball Attendance Behind

Based On AP Reports

Texas professional baseball generally is down in attendance for the first half of the 1950 campaign.

The 47 clubs in this state's baseball this season have drawn 1,942,050 as compared to 1,955,679 for 41 clubs last year.

Thus despite the fact that there was a new league—the Gulf Coast—that contributed four new teams and the Rio Grande Valley League added two for part of the season, attendance still was off.

The Big State League, Longhorn League, Rio Grande Valley and West-North Mexico Leagues were ahead, the Valley League, however, only because of the two new clubs—Donna-Weslaco and McAllen—which dropped out after about a month of play.
