

Library Improvements Made As Result of Expert's Survey

Robert A. House, acting librarian for the Cushing Memorial Library, was appointed to this position in November, 1949. Not a native Texan, House grew up in Colorado and received his college education at the University of Denver in 1939. In 1942 he transferred to Colorado A&M College and in the same year went into the service, joining the famous 10th Mountain Division.

In 1946 House came to the University of Texas library, and in September, 1949, was appointed Assistant Librarian at Texas A&M, and Acting Librarian upon the resignation of Paul S. Ballance.

A need has long been recognized for improvements in the A & M library, and last fall a survey of the library was made by two experts in the land grant college library field, Robert W. Orr of Iowa State, and William Carlson of Oregon State.

Special Teachers For Consolidated

Dr. Brown, Bill Roman Now Touring In Europe

Latest reports from abroad report that Dr. Sidney Brown, College Station, and Bill Roman, Bryan, are combining pleasure with business in their travels around Europe. Dr. Brown is a professor in the Biology Department at A&M. He arrived in Luxembourg early in June for a three months tour of the continent.

Bill Roman, a recent graduate of A&M, is accompanying Dr. Brown. Roman has just been accepted to the University of Texas Medical School in Galveston. He plans to begin his work there in September.

Latest word reported that Dr. Brown was visiting in Germany while Roman remained in Vienna. They visited France then Italy. In Italy they visited Rome, Venice, and Pompeii. They stopped in Austria and southern Germany, and Switzerland en route to Paris.

They have been observing sociology laboratories in Universities throughout Europe. Dr. Brown is particularly interested in information concerning Animal Tissue Culture. He hopes to incorporate this information into advance courses in biology at A&M. Provisions for this study are planned in the new Biological Sciences Building for next year.

Dr. Brown will attend the International Congress of Physiologists in Copenhagen, Denmark in the middle of August.

While in Paris they visited with Mr. and Mrs. G. W. Adriance and their daughter, Carolyn, of College Station. Dr. Adriance is head of the Horticulture Department of A&M and his family have been in Paris for the past year on a special assignment.

Dr. Brown and Roman plan to return to College Station on September 1, according to Mrs. Meta Brown. She is employed with the Cotton Research Laboratory of A&M this summer. She did not accompany her husband and Roman on their three month tour of Europe.

Dr. Brown will return to his office in the new Biological Sciences Building, which is in the process of being completed at present.
