

# Miller Hardware Gift Dept. Designed 'For the Aggies'

The Henry A. Miller Hardware Company will be only three years old in September. During the few years in business, the store has grown into a well-equipped, modern business establishment.

The building which houses the Miller store was built in 1946 by the Smith-Turner Hardware Company, of Navasota. At that time, Miller was working for that company in Navasota. A year later, Miller bought the store, and started in business on his own.

The original store consisted of a 55 by 100 ft. building, to which Miller has added a 24 by 80 ft. warehouse. Besides the original hardware stock, the store now features a complete line of gifts, which have been added "for the Aggies" according to Miller.

This gift department, he explained, was the result of many requests by Aggies for gifts for their mothers and girl friends.

Traveling Salesman

Miller got his start in the hardware business while working as a traveling salesman for the Walter H. Allen Company, a wholesale hardware company with offices in Dallas. While working for this company, Miller made contacts which enabled him later to go to work for the H. R. Turner Hardware Company of Navasota. He had worked for this company for three years before coming here to take over his new store.

Miller's right-hand man is Ernest Wilha, a College Station man, who heads the sales staff. Also on the sales staff is Mrs. J. M. McLain. Wilha runs the store while Miller is on buying trips, as well as managing the sales end of the business.

This Friday from 2 to 4 p. m., Miller will present Mrs. Evelyn Cave, a Maytag Home Economist, in a free cooking school. Free recipes as well as prizes, including a set of club aluminum, an iron, and a kitchen clock, will be given away. The school will be in the store building on Main Street.

Miller is a member of the local Kiwanis Club, as well as being a member of the Chamber of Commerce.

Mrs. Miller is active in the local Garden Club and the Campus Study Club. She also fills in at the store when needed.

The Millers have two children, Sally Ann, who is 11, and Henry A. II, who is only 4.

## Monroney Trys To Gain Seat of Elmer Thomas

Oklahoma City, July 25 — (AP) — Oklahoma Democrats are picking their candidates for U. S. Senate and Governor today in one of the bitterest run-off primaries in years.

A vote exceeding 400,000 is expected. Polls opened at 6 a. m. and will close at 7 p. m.

Elmer Thomas, a 73-year-old veteran of 24 years in the U. S. Senate, is fighting for his political life against Rep. Mike Monroney, Oklahoma's fifth district congressman since 1938.

Monroney led Thomas by 14,635 votes in the July 4 primary but lacked a majority in the seven-man race.

Liquor-in-bone-dry Oklahoma was injected as a side issue in the closing days of the Senate race. But the candidates themselves pitched their campaigns on preparedness, farm parities and rural electrification.

The Oklahoma United Drys, through their Secretary Rev. Roy Holloman and Attorney David C. Shapard endorsed Thomas. The senator told the drys he would support the Langer Bill which would bar interstate advertisement of liquor. Monroney said the measure was unconstitutional because it violated freedom of the press.

Later the United Drys president, the Rev. Lemuel Penn of Tulsa, in Korea took a serious turn and will vote there today by absentee ballot.

## Young Auctioneers Sell Watermelons

"Fifty-five-5-5-5-willya-gimme-5-5", the student auctioneers' voices droned at the Consolidated School last night in a practice auction. For most of them it was the first time to appear before a crowd.

These student have been attending an auctioneers' school in Bryan conducted by three auctioneers, Col. G. H. Shaw of Monroe, Iowa; Col. Charles Corkle of Norfolk, Nebraska; and Col. Two terms are held each year, with each term lasting two weeks.

The school is held in Howell House at Allen Academy with students attending from all over the country. It is believed by its teachers to be one of the two or three schools of this type in the United States.

The students attend regular classes, learning all the "tricks of the trade", and how to drone in their monotonous, sing-song voice. The Institute buys merchandise for students to sell in such auctions as the one held last night. Last night's proceeds went to the College Station Swimming Team.

The school's students are from all over North America. Out-of-staters include Paul Norris, Torrington, Wyoming; Roland Eckland, Seattle, Washington; Bill Yule, Calgary, Alberta, Canada; Jim Lowe, Des Moines, Iowa; Gene Watson, Hutchinson, Kansas; Joy deat Cutlip, Mount Sterling, Ohio; and Percy Williamson, Balswin, Mississippi. Texans include Fred Thompson, Wellington; Frank Weed, Utopia; Elton Davis, Mount Pleasant; J. Poyner, Junction; Gene Harris, Plainview, and Sam Speight, Fort Worth.

Following the completion of the school, the students will be fully qualified auctioneers, and will receive Auctioning licenses.

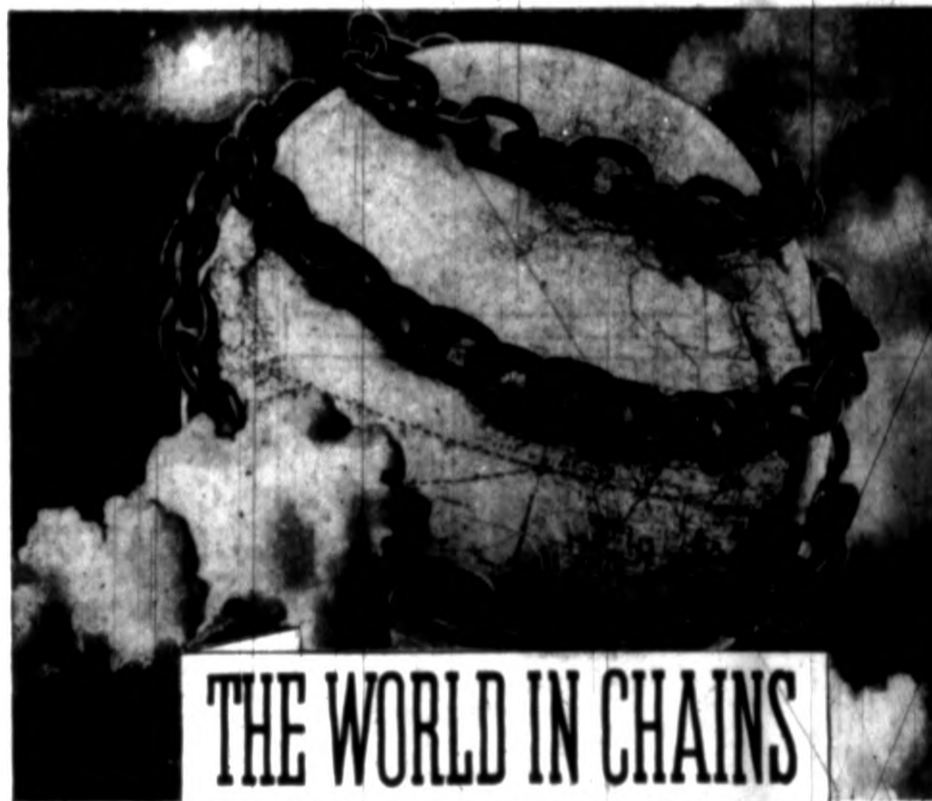
