

Regional Meet For Jr. Olympic Begins Monday

Kyle Field will be the scene of many a grunt, groan, and gasp during the Junior Olympics regional tryouts Monday and Tuesday. Five local athletes have already signed up, and other young hopefuls from surrounding towns as far away as Dallas have sent in their entries, with more expected to be on the way.

The meet, sponsored by the College Station Recreation Council, is open to boys and girls under 17 years old. It will include competition in track and field and tennis. Colonel Frank Anderson, Aggie track coach, will supervise the track and field tryouts, and A&M tennis coach W. M. Dowell will be in charge of the tennis tournaments.

So far, the only local entrant in the track competition is Dicky Dwyer, son of Coach W. M. Dowell. Dwyer will run both the 880 and the high hurdles, and from the results of his pre-meet work-outs he should take both events without much difficulty.

At this writing, four racket-wielders from the Bryan-CG area had signed up for competition; they are Bobby Jackson, Freddy Anderson, Tommy Terrell, and Billy Blakely. These boys promise to give visiting players plenty to worry about as each one of them packs a mighty wicked racket.

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North Downs South All-Star Cagers

Austin, Aug. 4.—(AP)—The North broke in front and sped to an easy 24-27 victory last night over the South in the annual all-star basketball game of the Texas Coaching School.

A crowd of 4,368 was in Gregory Gym. To see the game.

It was the sixth straight time the North had triumphed in the cage classic of the Texas Coaching School.

The closest the South ever got was five points.

Joe Abbott, five foot-four guard from Canyon, was picked as the outstanding player of the game. He scored seven points and played a brilliant court game for the North. Abbott beat out Jerry Norton of Texarkana, the all-star football player who was top man for the South, by one vote among sportswriters covering the game.

Art Finders of Thomas Jefferson (San Antonio) and Norton scored nine points for the South while Jackie Bell of Fort Worth Poly had the same number for the North.

The North squad was coached by Henry Iba of Oklahoma A&M, and the South by Adolph Rupp of Kentucky.

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
