

## Troop 102 Sets Weekend Camp On Llano River

Boy Scouts in Troop 102 of College Station have voted to take a 3-day camp-out on the Llano River in Llano County. About 25 boys will leave Sunday afternoon and return Wednesday afternoon.

George W. Rivers, research instructor in agronomy and acting scout master, will accompany the Troop. An Army bus belonging to the Military Department has been assigned to the Troop to provide transportation.

Lt. Col. Walter H. Parsons Jr., associate professor of military science and tactics, has been selected chairman of the troop committee which furnishes adult guidance to the Troop. He succeeds Tad Moses.

Troop 102 sponsored by the Kiwanis Club of College Station. A few months ago, Kiwanis budgeted \$100 for a trip by the boys to a Texas vacation center of their own selection.

Representatives of the Kiwanis Club had offered to support the Troop in either helping with the expenses of one or two attending the recent Boy Scout National Jamboree at Valley Forge, Pa., or giving the entire Troop an outing of several days. The boys were unanimous in their decision for an all-Troop activity.

## Water Situation Looking Brighter

News came today from College Station city officials that the threatening water shortage has almost been curbed, although temporary restrictions have been requested in order to build up reservoirs to safe depths.

For the past three days, officials of Bryan, College Station, and the college have asked that people water their yards only between the hours of 6 and 10 p. m. each day. These are the hours when water consumption is the lightest and would permit enough for those who wish to spend the late hours in their yards.

The officials have asked, however, that residents of the two cities refrain from watering their grass and shrubs today and tonight, so the supply tanks can again be built up to a safe capacity.

A measurement will be made of the storage tanks Saturday morning to determine whether or not a safe supply of water will be on hand for watering of yards over the weekend.

We suggest you call the city office late Saturday morning and check with local authorities before watering more than a necessary amount of water over the weekend.

The situation looked rather critical last weekend, but everyone responded so promptly to pleas made by College Station, Bryan, and college authorities to conserve water, that no serious shortage has as yet occurred here.

### Fire Sight-Seers Hindering Firemen's Efficiency

Fire sight-seers have been causing a constant menace to local firemen in their efforts to quickly and effectively put out the many fires that have been reported in the past two weeks.

Certain city officials have authorized firemen that follow trucks to fire locations.

But many times these officials are not in the vicinity of the fire when it is reported and are not able to prevent anxious spectators from rushing behind the trucks and possibly hindering the firemen's speed and accuracy in extinguishing the flames.

With the weather as it has been during the past month, practically every vacant lot that has weeds is a potential tinderbox.

Only a cigarette carelessly tossed into the weeds might start a fire which could result in serious damage.

Firemen answered a call Sunday morning and another Monday afternoon. The alarm was also sounded yesterday for a fire at Easterwood Airport.

In almost every case, people have raced behind the trucks only to see the fire, not realizing they may be a handicap to firemen who are putting it out.

Local police have issued a warning, and, unless the situation is justified, they say they will be forced to closely observe the state law which prohibits spectators from going within two blocks of a fire.

### Scenes Around the City . . .

The Tax Equalization Board will be finished with its work in another day or two, according to Ran Boswell, city secretary.

Boswell said all people with delinquent taxes have been mailed letters warning them that unless these assessments are paid by September 1, names of the tax delinquents will be published by the city.

A parking lot will soon be available behind the Boyett Building on Sulphur Springs Road at the North Gate. An old wooden structure that has been behind this building was moved, and present plans call for a cleaning and graveling job by the city on that space.

Although only employees of the stores in the immediate vicinity of the lot will be allowed to park there, it will nevertheless leave valuable spaces in front of the store for shoppers to park.

O. H. Boyett, owner of the property, has consented to the city's request for parking on the vacant lot.

Construction of the new A&M Methodist Church is progressing very noticeably. Steel girders and wood rafters are being put into place and a general outline of the overall size and appearance of the building can be gathered.

The new church's progress is noted day by day by almost every pedestrian or motorist passing through the North Gate area.

A church such as the new Methodist building will certainly do much to add to the beauty of the North Gate area, as well as the city of College Station.

### In Passing . . .

A Burroughs utility billing machine was installed yesterday at the City Hall. The new machine, valued at more than \$1,500, will replace the worn-out device used until this time.

The City Council will meet in regular session Monday night. Among items on the agenda for the meeting will be adoption (or rejection) of a new house numbering system and changes in names of a few streets.

Also meeting early next week will be the College Station Chamber of Commerce board of directors. The group will convene in the second story meeting room of the College Station State Bank at 2 p. m. Tuesday. Expected topics for discussion will follow through on the Bryan chamber's proposal for bringing the Texas State Coaching School to A&M.

City workmen are nearly half-finished with a project at the Main Street-Church Street intersection at the North Gate. A drainage problem has been causing quite a bit of trouble there every time a large rain comes along.

## Mrs. Reiser Explains Secret Of Party Food Preparation

Mrs. Raymond Reiser not only pleases her own guests with her professional looking (and tasting) party foods, but she lets everyone in on her secrets of party foods. Mrs. Reiser's specialty is very fancy foods. Some of her most popular delicacies are Pecan Crisps, Vichayoisse, Coconut Balls, and Coconut Mousse. In the very fancy department of her special party foods we found a spread made with caviar.

### Special Services Available

Mrs. Reiser might be talked into making some of her little canapés for your next tea or coffee, if you want it to be a special party with lots of compliments for the hostess. She will make appetizers, canapés and dips for the party. All that you need to worry about will be the coffee, or tea and the guests. The party food will supply the refreshments and the conversation.

When we dropped in on Mrs. Reiser at her home at 105 Ayrshire in College Park she was planning her menu for a dinner party that night. She told us so much about her Coconut Mousse that we finally persuaded her to let us go out to the kitchen and see what it is like.

The mousse was unmolded and placed on a large platter. The mold was perfect; it looked like a color advertisement in a current magazine.

It looked tempting but we had mercy on the dinner guests and saved it for them, not before we got a picture of the mousse and Mrs. Reiser, however.

### Coconut Mousse

We also persuaded her to tell us how to make this cool dessert. Here are her instructions:

First check to be sure that you have:  
1 1/2 packages of plain gelatin  
1 1/2 cups of milk  
1/2 cup sugar  
1 teaspoon of almond flavoring  
pinch of salt  
1/2 cup of water  
1 cup of fresh coconut  
1 cup of whipping cream  
1/2 cup additional coconut (to sprinkle over top.)

Then soften the gelatin in 1/4 cup of water. Heat the milk and the sugar. Take it off the flame and add the gelatin mixture. Allow it to set and thicken. Fold in the cup of coconut and the cup of whipped cream.

Add the almond flavoring; it will fill a one quart mold. Make it a day before you want to serve it. Unmold and sprinkle with the remaining coconut, just before you plan to serve. Arrange any fruit which happens to be in season, around the mold.

Mrs. Reiser planned to serve vichayoisse, fried chicken, corn butter beans, cucumber-lime Jello mold salad, hot poppy seed rolls, and the coconut mousse to her dinner guests that evening.

### Invented Coconut Balls Recipes

Mrs. Reiser invented the recipe for her Coconut Balls herself. She uses a basic three egg sponge cake in which she puts two teaspoons of rum flavoring. She makes a butter icing and puts two teaspoons of rum flavoring in it also.

She then cuts sponge cake up into small inch squares. She sees them all over and rolls in fresh coconut. She lets them stand for a day in a cookie tin. This improves them.

their flavor. She sometimes varies the taste of the Coconut balls by using a teaspoon of Nescafe rather than the rum, to create a mocha flavor. She rolls these in chopped nuts.

### Pecan Crisp

Another popular recipe is her Pecan Crisp recipe. In making these she uses:

1 cup butter  
1/2 cup of confectionary sugar  
1 1/2 cups of flour  
2 teaspoons of vanilla  
2 cups pecans, cut fine

Cream the butter and add sugar and vanilla. Mix well and add pecans and flour. Make into rolls 2 1/4 inches long and 1/2 inch wide. Place in a cookie pan and bake at 350 degrees in the oven for fifteen minutes. Roll them in powdered sugar. These are especially good when served with coffee or tea.

(Hint: Most men like these pecan crisps because of the abundance of nuts.)

She makes her dips, which may be served at morning coffee, in several different recipes. Here is one of her favorites:

4 ounces of cottage cheese,  
one medium grated carrot,  
3 tablespoons of salad dressing

one teaspoon of Beau monde sauce

Flavor the mixture with garlic sauce and salt and pepper. Mix it all together and serve with potato chips as a dip.

### You Can Serve Caviar

You can serve caviar, Mrs. Reiser serves it, and this is the way she prepares it.

1 package of Philadelphia creamed cheese  
1 grated, medium sized onion  
2 tablespoons of red (domestic) caviar

Mix all together; there will be enough juice from the onion and oil of the caviar to make a paste. This caviar mixture tastes delicious when spread on crackers, potato chips or toasted party-rye bread.

Mrs. Reiser has her own special touch which makes her food taste special in taste and in texture. Her big secret is in obtaining the right texture to suit the most particular tastes.

Her husband, a connoisseur of good foods from experience in eating good foods, insists that food must have the right texture to taste good.
