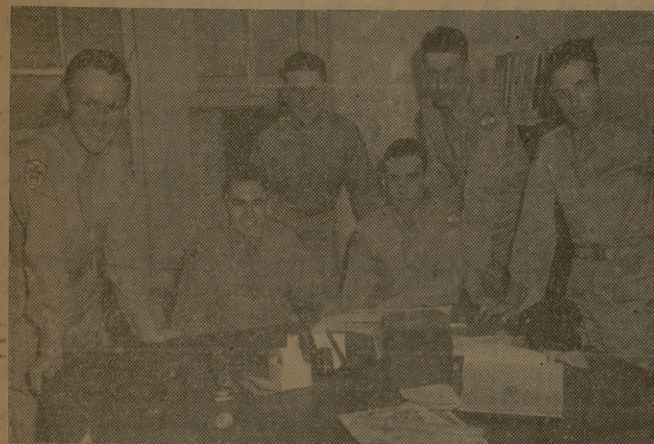

## Agricultural Editors In 6-Day Conference

The 34th Annual Conference of the American Association of Agricultural College Editors got under way last Tuesday at Mo-Ranch near Kerrville, Tex., according to Louis Franke, head of the Agricultural Extension Service at A&M.

Twenty-six editors from extension services and experiment stations in ten states and other members of the editorial staffs of the organizations are attending the conference.

Purpose of the conference is to study reports on new editorial methods and problems in extension and experiment news service, to exchange ideas, and to study effective use of television.

Attending From A&M Those attending the meeting from A&M are Franke, in charge of the editorial office at the Extension Service, D. A. Adams, radio editor for the Extension Service, and Mrs. Eloise Johnson, extension family life specialist at A&M.

Ted Moses, editor of the Experiment Station publications, is also attending the conference. Others from A&M are Francis Arnold and Mrs. Francis Kivlehen, both of the Extension Service Department.

During the four day period from Sept. 4-9, talks will be heard by such men as R. W. Trullinger, chief, office of Experiment Stations, United States Department of Agriculture, Washington, D. C.; Stanley Andrews, associate editor of Foreign Agriculture Relations.

**Panel Heard**  
I. F. Kellholz, associate editor, The Country Gentleman, was on a panel entitled "This is Our Business" which was heard Wednesday morning. Others on the panel were Joe McClelland, University of Arizona; and Ovid Bay, University of Missouri.

During the conference, group sessions programs will be held, one for each sub-division in the extension and experiment service editorial office. The groups are the press, radio, visual aids, and publications groups.

The conference will adjourn at noon Saturday after installation of new officers which will be elected Friday morning.

## House to Inspect VA Handling of G.I. Bill

Washington, Sept. 7 (AP)—Speaker Rayburn next week is expected to name a special nine-man House committee to look into the GI education program, Rep. Teague (D-Tex.) said today.

Teague told a reporter the appointment of five Democrats and four Republicans may come Monday or Tuesday.

The resolution authorizing the investigation was sponsored by Teague and he is expected to head the committee.

He said he hopes the House will vote \$40,000 to finance the inquiry. The group will investigate the entire GI training program and the way it has been administered by the Veterans administration.

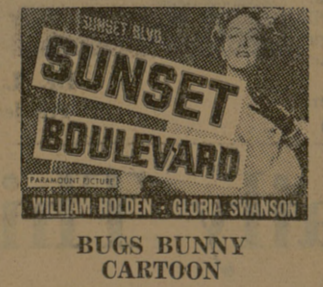
Last winter the agency said the program was being "abused" by some schools operated for profit. Teague took issue with the VA and said many of the "alleged"

abuses were the VA's own fault. He asked the VA to name the specific schools it said were guilty of abuses. The VA has refused to do so.

Since then President Truman has signed legislation tightening up the whole program.

## Smith Appointed to National Council

Dr. H. A. Smith, Head of the Department of Veterinary Pathology of the School of Veterinary Medicine, has been appointed a member of the Committee on Pathology of the National Research Council and the National Academy of Sciences.

The Council was organized in 1916 as a subsidiary of the National Academy (created in 1863 by Act of Congress) for "the promotion of research in the physical and biological sciences and the dissemination of scientific knowledge in all fields for the benefit of the Nation."

The Committee on Pathology is made up of twelve pathologists of note from all parts of the Nation. Dr. Smith is also assigned to the Sub-committee on American Registries of Pathology.
