**TCU Seeking Second SWC Win
Marks 46th Meeting With Ags**

**Aggies Will Try for Their First
TCU Win Since Defeat in 1947**

Texas Christian's Horned Frogs will come to College Station this Saturday in quest of their fourth straight win over A&M and their second conference victory for the season. Coach Dutch Meyer's crew has bested the Aggies in every meeting since TCU's 26-0 win in Fort Worth in 1947. This encounter marks the 46th time that the two teams have met. Of the 45 previous games since 1897, TCU is big enough for regular duty in the line. But so far, they've done right well. The Cadets have won 24, TCU 17 and four have ended in ties.

TCU's lone conference victory thus far has been over the Arkansas Razorbacks. They opened their season by squeaking by Kansas. The next weekend they were upset by Oklahoma A&M. The Arkansas victory came on the heels of that defeat followed by the last week's 19-6 win over Texas Tech.

Meyer will bring with him a formation he calls the "T-wing." The Meyer "T-wing" calls for a balanced line with ends split slightly out. There is a regular T formation 'upback' and regular T fullback. But the halfbacks are stationed wide—directly behind and a yard back of the ends.

Uses Spread Too
From this setup, some of the familiar T formation running plays are possible. While at the same time it still retains some of the potentialities of the double-wing. Meyer's team sometimes reverts back to its familiar spread formation.

Included in the TCU mentor's bag of tricks will be a host of players that perhaps are capable of performing grid-iron magic for their crafty master.

Will they be able to stop, or even slow down one of the most powerful rushing attacks in football this season? The Aggies currently hold down the number 10 spot in the nation in rushing offense with 1136 yards.

The Christians enter the fray in their best physical shape of the season. Capt. Clarence Marable, who missed the first two games, will be in the lineup as well as several other men who have been on the injured list.

The "little men" have taken over the middle of the TCU line this fall. A center and two guards with an average weight of only 181 pounds have won themselves a home in Meyer's scheme of things.

Left to right, the lads are Dick Lowe, 188-pound senior from Wichita Falls; Roy (Red) Pitcock, 177-pound junior from Graham and Alton Taylor, 180-pound junior from Austin. By Southwest Conference standards, none of the trio

is big enough for regular duty in the line. But so far, they've done right well. The Cadets have won 24, TCU 17 and four have ended in ties.

Feature Fast Guards
Lowe and Taylor, the guards, start quick and move fast. They are especially effective when the Frogs are using their famed spread formation and under the direction of Line Coach Allie White have become most proficient at down-field blocking.

Pitcock, a fiery young man who came to TCU without a scholarship, moved in to a regular job when the veteran Max Eubank went down with a bad knee before the opening game. For the first three Frog games, Red stood out on offense along with his small running mates.

For the Texas Tech battle last week, big soph Carlton McCormack was given his chance on offense and did well. Pitcock moved over to defense and his slashing play won him a lineman-of-the-week nomination from Coach Meyer.

Sophs Shine
Dutch is rather "high" on a half dozen young sophomores and may use them against Texas A&M this week. McCormack who goes 221, is one. Ends Teddy Vaught of Lubbock, Bobby Blair of Texarkana and Wayne Martin of Shamrock have also earned the right to play a lot of football this season.

In the backfield, tall and lean John Harville of Fort Worth's Paschal moved into the offensive picture last week. The gangling 6-2, 190-pounder has always been ruggid on defense but when injuries to Johnny Dunn pushed him into the offensive left half spot against Tech, the tall one went to the city.

He carried 7 times for 55 yards and snagged one pass. He may play a lot this week.

Top Frog soph, tall and lean Gilbert Bartosh. The sweet little quarterback from Granger is improving rapidly in all departments and will be at the helm of the Purple attack throughout most of the season. He completed 6 of 10 passes against Tech for 82 yards and carried 10 times for 70 yards. He didn't play any of the last half but will open against the Aggies.

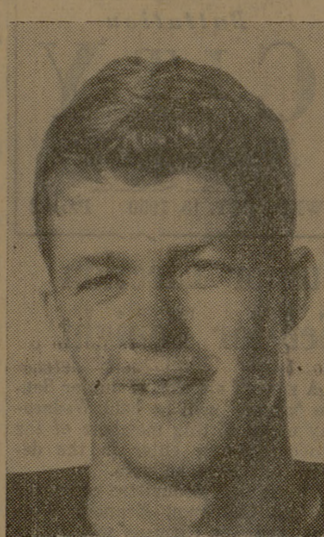
