## New Booklet Tells What To Do During Atom Attack

Washington, Nov. 3—(AP)—“You can survive!” With that introduction, the government put out yesterday its long-promised booklet telling everybody exactly what to do if an atom bomb is dropped.

You can survive an a-bomb blast, the government said, if you're lucky enough not to be right under the bomb and if you follow these “six survival secrets:”

● Try to get shielded. If you have time, get down in a basement or subway. If you're caught outdoors, seek shelter alongside a building, in a ditch or gutter.

● Drop flat, on the ground or floor. To keep from being tossed about or hit by flying objects.

● Bury your face in your arms. This will protect your face from flash burns, prevent temporary blindness and keep blast debris out of your eyes.

● Don't rush outside right after a bombing.

● Stick to canned and bottled foods and beverages. Unprotected food and water may have radioactive poison.

● Don't start rumors. In the confusion that follows a bombing, a single rumor might touch off a panic that could cost your life.

The new booklet is the first of its kind the government has put out

for the public. A more technical work was published last August by the Atomic Energy Commission.

This new booklet, “Survival Under Atomic Attack,” was prepared by the National Security Resources Board. It sells for a dime (Superintendent of Documents, Washington, 25, D.C.)

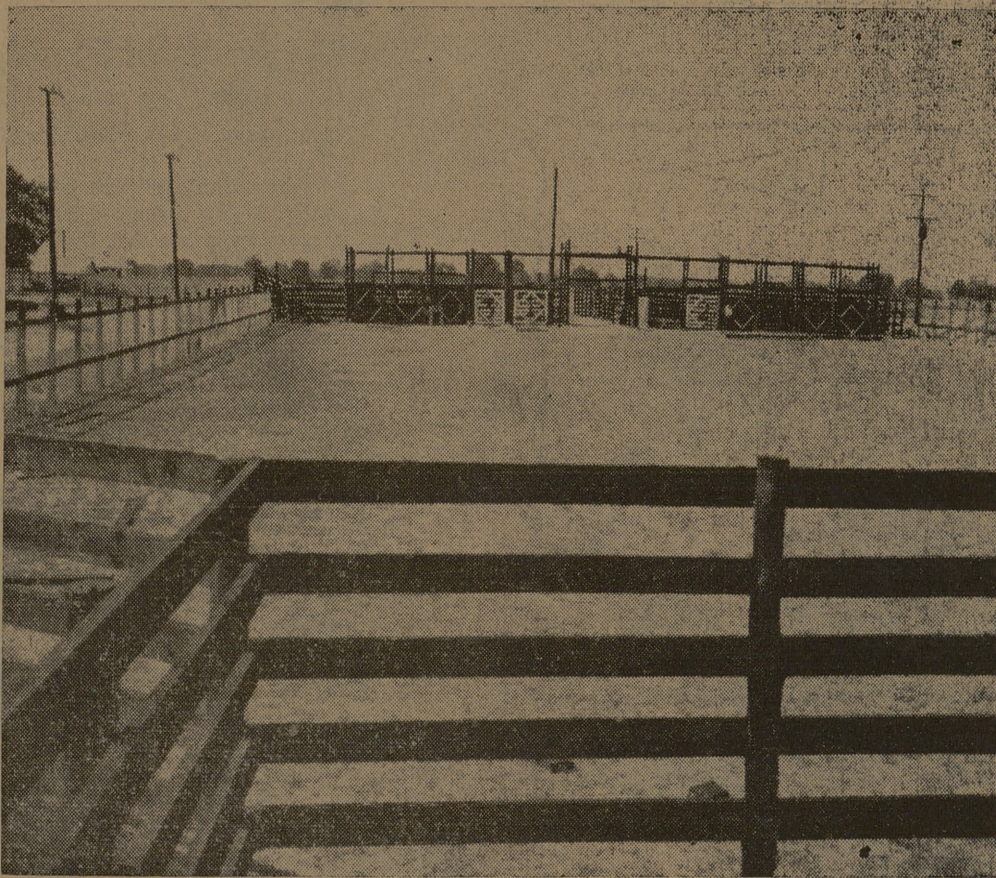
