The 43-year-old Yale trained physician is resting comfortably in St. Joseph's hospital at Albuquerque. She was taken there Monday after her release on \$25,000 bond pending trial.

Trapped by the FBI as she reached for a \$20,000 ransom, Dr. Campbell calmly told how she'd kidnapped and drugged nine-year-old Linda Stamm of Santa Fe Friday.

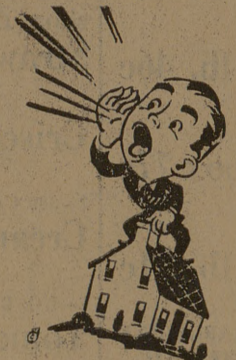

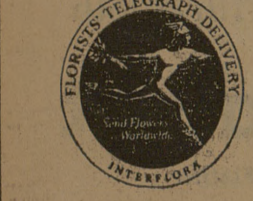
