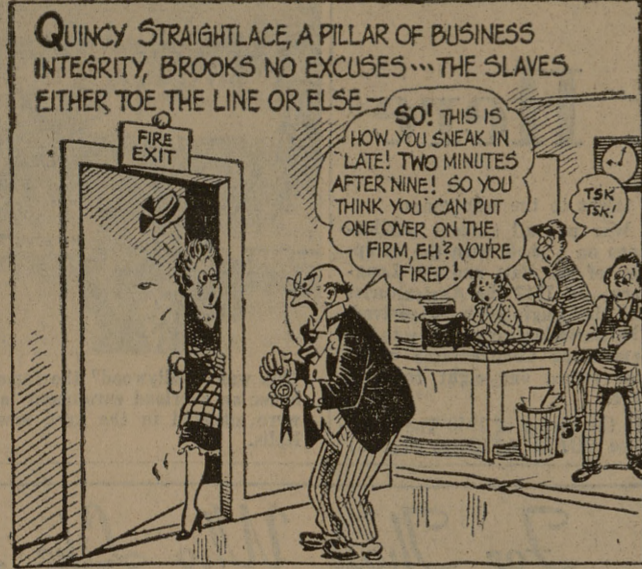

China, since that would leave them an easier pushover for Russia, which has a vast land army in Europe.

Whether or not we have to jump into the sea and abandon Korea, this country is going into a great arms program.

If the Russians are polite enough to wait, that program may take two years or more before our western allies feel they can stand off a Russian attack.

But will Russia sit back and wait until the west has time to create a great army, which doesn't exist now? Maybe no. This is deep winter, not the best time for any army to begin war in Europe.

But Spring is coming. Maybe then the Russians will decide to move. And there is irony in all this:

For years inside and outside congress there have been unending protests against government controls. But strict controls will be necessary if this country is going on a real war-footing.

So, to survive, this country which dislikes government controls so much will have to submit to them. That seems certain now, with living costs going up, for if they go up unchecked the country will be wrecked anyway.

But if this country has to become a military state, with wide controls, and stays that way for years, there is the simple question ahead: will the economy ever get back what it has been?
