

Possibility Of PCC Abandoning Rose Bowl

Los Angeles, Jan. 24—(AP)—Paul Zimmerman, sports editor of the Los Angeles Times, says there is "grave danger" that the Pacific Coast Conference will abandon its commitment to the Pasadena Rose Bowl football game.

Zimmerman says he has learned that Idaho, Washington State, Oregon and Oregon State are "definitely against the continuance of the pact with the Pasadena Tournament of Roses Association," and

that California, UCLA and Stanford are apt to swing into the same line of thinking "and Washington will go along with what the majority of the California schools do."

Southern California, Zimmerman says, is anxious to continue with the Rose Bowl.

The Pacific Coast Conference has had an agreement with the Western Conference (Big Ten) for the Rose Bowl games, but it has expired.

"No Special Cases For Athletes"—Rosenberg

Washington, Jan. 24—(AP)—The excitement over drafting 4-F athletes into the armed services simmered down to this today:

Athletes will get the same treatment every one else does, no better and no worse.

A spokesman for the Surgeon General's office said that's the way it was in World War II. He said athletes who were classified in 4-F then definitely belonged there.

Mrs. Anna Rosenberg, Assistant Secretary of Defense, said today: "Athletes will be regarded like anyone else when it comes to possible deferment." Secretary of Defense Marshall shocked the sports world all the way down to its sweat socks by saying it may be necessary to draft for limited service some athletes who flunked

their selective service exams and wind up 4-Fs.

As for athletes in World War II, the surgeon general's spokesman said:

"We made a study after the last war to see how men could be active in sports and still not be able to pass their physical examinations. What we found was surprising.

"Some athletes had incipient tuberculosis. Others had advanced cases of syphilis. Others had all sorts of chronic diseases. They seemed to be able to give a good account of themselves in sports, but they wouldn't be much good for the long haul.

Tigers Halted By Somerville For 2nd Loss
