Selection of Coach To Be This Week-If, But and Maybe

A&M's new head football coach will be "elected within three or four days," Athletic Director Barlow "Bones" Irvin said yesterday.

"It won't be much more than a week," Athletic Council Chairman D. W. Williams said.

One thing is definite. A&M will have a coach before Fall training begins.

And, judging from the definite comments the pair made to us yesterday, you can rest assured that the new coach will under 75 years, above 75 pounds, will be male, and will shave at least twice a week.

On the more serious side, though, Irvin was instructed by the Council at its Sunday afternoon meeting to begin talks with about three or four major prospects.

One of these, he told us, will be Dick Todd—although Irvin emphasized bluntly that Todd is by no means the selection. Todd was on the campus yesterday and talked to Irvin. Whether other candidates will come to the college later this week is an un-answered question.

The former A&M great flew in from his Crowell home yesterday morning and landed at Easterwood Field.

More than 30 men were under consideration for the top grid post, Irvin said. Now the Athletic Council has whittled the number down to three or four.

A coach, we do believe, will be named this week. The meeting of the Council to make the selection may be conducted by telephone, if it is inconvenient to hold another meeting on the campus.

We might as well join the bandwagon in guessing who the coach will be. We'll say Todd, with P. L. "Pinky" Downs running a close second. But we can't help but laugh at the early speculations of some of our state sportswriters, particularly one.

Jack Gallagher, pride of the Houston Post, frankly stated in his column a few weeks ago that Irvin would be the coach. No ifs or

but, either. He would be "it." Irvin has since ruled himself out by saying he didn't want the job.

Our Guess on Todd is just that—a wild, unqualified guess.

Harry Stiteler told us yesterday that he has received a few offers for a coaching position. The former A&M head coach declined to name the schools involved. Dressed as neatly as always and looking as bright as the day A&M took SMU last Fall, he was clearing his desk in the coach's office.

"I'm going to be living here for a while yet," Harry said. "When I make my decision on a job, I want to be very sure I'm making the right move. I don't know yet whether it'll be another coaching spot or private business. I'm just taking my time and trying to decide exactly what I want."

The small, friendly man would be an excellent choice for some college currently without a top-rate coach. He is one.

Eco, English Profs Bowl

A Engineers, I AF Tie

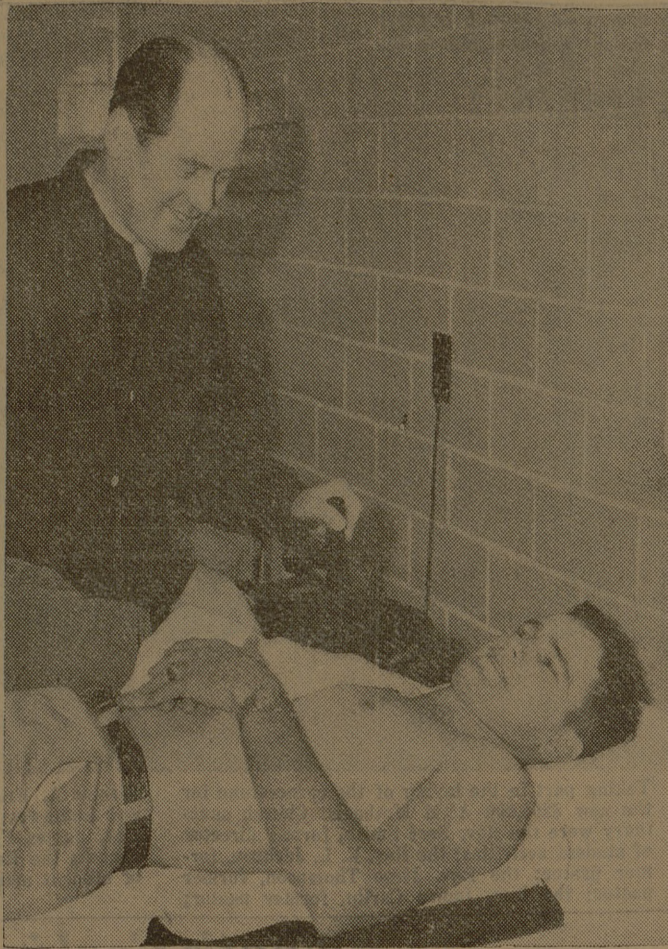
A Engineers and I AF battled to a 2-2 tie before the game was called because of the time limit. Both clubs scored their two runs in the fourth.

Hubert Goes on Mound Against Baylor Today

The Baylor Bears, holders of third-place honors in the 1950 Southwest Conference pennant race, meet the Aggies this afternoon at 3 on Kyle Field.

Since it is the opening conference tilt for both teams, the game should be a good indication as to the possibilities of the two clubs. With Baylor relying on its pitching staff, and the Aggies on their power-house hitting, the Bruins should come out ahead.

A&M finished last season in second place with nine wins and five losses, while Baylor came in third with eight wins and seven losses.

Baylor ended its pre-conference play by defeating the Minnesota Gophers by a safe margin of 13-1. Ray Fitzpatrick of the Bears pitched the victory allowing only six hits. Williams, third baseman for the Bruins, paced the hitters with three for five.

Handling the pitching chores for A&M today will be Pat Hubert. Al Ogletree will catch. Taking the mound for the Bears will be Clyde "Robbie" Robinson, with a 4-3 record in last year's competition.

Isbell in Lineup

Larry Isbell, a junior hailing from Houston, will do the catching for Robinson, and is being counted on by Bear Coach Vic Bradford to handle a large part of the Bruins' hitting.

In the team batting competition last year, A&M finished second with Baylor trailing close behind in third place. And in the team fielding averages, A&M placed

fifth with Baylor crowding them in sixth place.

Probable starters for the Bears tomorrow in their batting order are Williams at third base, Parker fielding, Isbell catching, and Newton at second base batting clean-up.

Miles will bat fifth and play first base, Davis next playing short-stop, Stotts at center field, Willoughby in left field, and Price in center field.

Strong Reserves

Russell and Obrien hold the reserve spots and Fitzpatrick, with a good showing of six fan-outs in the last Minnesota game, will be the reserve pitcher in case Robinson gets in trouble.

To compare with Baylor's double win of 7-3 and 13-1 over the Minnesota Gophers last week, the

Aggies split their twin bill with the Gophers in a 2-0 win and a 1-0 loss.

Backing Hubert and Ogletree's pitching today will be Lary at first base, Ecrette at second, Wallace at short stop, and Candelari at third. DeWitt will be in left field, Russell in center and McPherson in right field.

Russell Only New Man

The entire team, with the exception of Russell who is up from the fish team, consists of lettermen from last year.

If the A&M pitching staff develops to match the hitting crew, then the Aggies could become "the power" in Southwest Conference competition this Spring, said Coach Beau Bell.

A&M split their two-game series with Baylor last year, winning 11-4 and losing 7-1.

Golfers Upend Houstonians On U of H Courts Monday

Texas A&M's golf team scored a 4-2 victory over the University of Houston Monday at Houston Country Club. Earlier this season the Aggies had blanked the Cougars in six matches at College Station.

Billy Skinner defeated Houstonian Billy Baker, 2 and 1, for UH's only singles victory. Skinner teamed with Sid Frink to beat A&M's Tony Guerrero and Baker, 1 up, for Houston's other victory. Guerrero downed Frink in the number one match, 2 and 1.

Other A&M victories were scored by John Barrett, 4 and 3, over Jim Brizzolara and by Bob Dohoney over Tom Tyson, 7 and 6. Barrett and Dohoney downed Tyson and Brizzolara in doubles, 6 and 5. Dohoney had the day's best medal score. He was one over par when he finished off Tyson on the 12th hole.
