## A Neat Little Frame-Up?...

THE Kaesong peace talks are nearing collapse. These long drawn-out discussions have been going on for seven weeks now, and an incident taking place in the neutral zone has given the Communies a chance to delay the talks still further.

There is more talk about the unfortunate incident than about peace. The incident causing this delay happened Sunday. A Red soldier was shot and killed. The Red negotiators demand an explanation. Gen. Ridgway has said that he believes it's a frame-up by the Russians purely for the sake of stalling or eliminating the peace talks.

## Removing Non-Educators

M. E. DUMAS superintendent of the Corsicana State Orphans Home has been relieved of his job because he is not an educator.

Many of the ex-students of the orphans home have rallied to Dumas' defense. Dumas claims he was "smeared by false publicity."

Regardless of his abilities as an educator, his plan for the orphans home seems basically sound. Dumas told the board that his program had:

- Co-operated in all ways possible in developing the educational program.
- Not permitted maltreatment or severe punishment of the students.
- Improved recreational facilities.
- Made attendance at religious services on the campus compulsory.
- Raised social levels of the students.

Dumas admitted that the orphans home had been deficient in education but that he had taken steps to the correction of this ill.

Could it be that the Health Board was more interested in dismissing Dumas than interested in seeing orphans have a better place in which to live?

The Far Eastern commander says the Reds killed the Red soldier themselves and are now shouting for an explanation. Other observers think that the killing could have been done either by Red or South Korean guerrillas.

All U.N. officials deny that any of their soldiers were near the neutral zone when the killing occurred.

Since reports of Communist build-up inside North Korea are continuing to flow in, it appears that Gen. Ridgway's assumption might be the truth.

It's a known fact that certain elements in South Korea would resent the peace talks bringing about a settlement. However, many on the scene observers agree that Sigman Rhee, President of South Korea, has come over to our way of thinking since he first made public statements to the effect he was opposed to the proposed peace treaty.

Could this shooting be nothing more than a frame-up by the Reds?

## Back From Cotton Tour

### Mexico Student Speaks at Kiwanis

The outstanding characteristic of towns in Mexico today is the presence of an old church standing in striking contrast to a new school building. Pablo Maurer, an agronomy student from Atlitico, Pueblo, Mexico told members and guests of the College Station Kiwanis Club yesterday at their noon luncheon.

Maurer along with four other students recently completed the annual "Cotton Tour" sponsored by the Agronomy Department to Mexico and Central America. Urging all tourists to act as good will ambassadors to Latin America, the speaker said a knowledge of Spanish was essential in order to understand the people.

Dr. Luther Jones, who was in charge of the 7,000 mile trip, introduced Maurer and pointed out

some outstanding personal impressions of the lands and people visited. Altitude, geography, the uniform population, and the complete satisfaction which our Latin neighbors have in their mode of living were listed.

As a supplement to the talks, slides were shown of the trip which began at Weslaco, the jumping off place, progressed through Mexico and ended in Central America.

Scenes depicting the life, resources, and picturesque beauty of Mexico and Central America were viewed. Ancient Mayan ruins, the avocado industry, breeds of cattle, roads, dwellings, and outstanding architecture is a list of a few of the things touched upon.

In his talk, Maurer reviewed the past history of Mexico from a Spanish colony to the 1920's when the government redistributed the lands to the people.

Government projects such as the building of dams, and the work being done by the Rockefeller Foundation in developing new crops are contributing most to the development of the country, he said.

## Texas' 36th Launches New Type Training

Camp Polk, La., Aug. 22—(AP)—Texas' 36th Division will launch a new type of training today that might well become a pattern for the nation's citizen soldiers.

The division has formed a special battalion, a division information officer said, to train new members of the division—a "catching up" type of training that will bring the recruit up to the same general level as the men who have more training time than they.

"We hope to make this type of training the sort of thing that will solve the annual problems of the National Guard" Maj. Gen. H. Miller Ainsworth, division commander, said yesterday.

The new battalion will exist during training hours only. The program will not remove men from their own units at other times.

The general named as commander of the special battalion Lt. Col. M. B. Ethredge, Jr., state representative from Huntsville, holder of three silver stars and present military government officer of the 36th.

Capt. Audie Murphy, film star and most decorated soldier of World War II, will be one of the instructors. Murphy joined the 36th last year.

Rugged field exercises in bridge building, demolition, and night problems on bivouac helped to take off excess poundage from many of the College Station reservists, and left them in excellent physical condition. Sick call was a lonely formation at Camp Polk.

Division staff officers commented on the excellent spirit of members of the 22nd as they broke camp here today. They predicted that the fine spirit and interest exhibited during the summer session would be reflected in greatly increased interest in the reserve program.

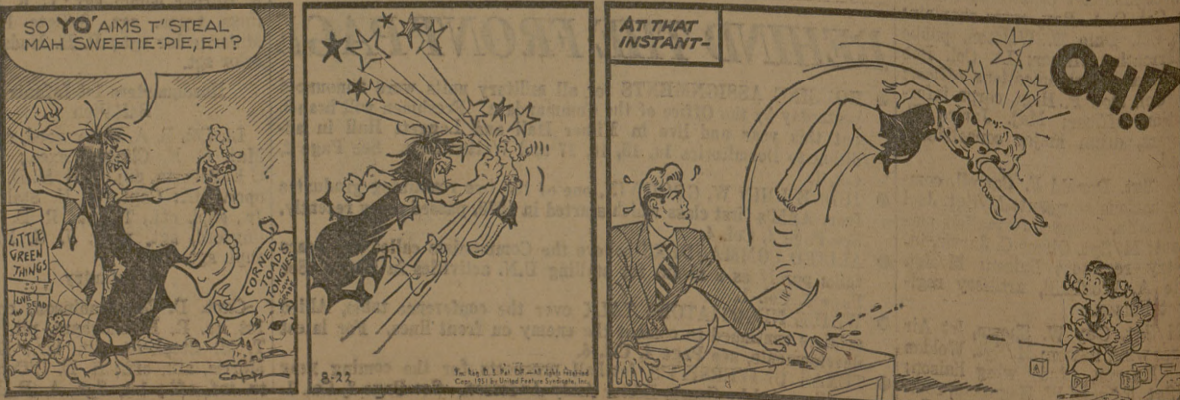
