Rare Disease Kills Experimental 'Coon

Anthrax, a deadly blood infection which commonly affects cattle, recently caused the death of a raccoon being used for experimental purposes, said Dr. H. A. Smith, head of the veterinary pathology department.

Two other raccoons that died at the same time are believed to have contacted this disease which is rarely found in game animals, he added.

In Good Condition
John E. Wood, graduate student in the wildlife management department, who was experimenting with the animals said the raccoons seemed in good condition the night before their death. There had been no change in their feeding or care other than they were fed a squirrel which Wood had killed.

Smith believes the 'coons received the disease from the squirrel meat which was probably infected with the Anthrax germ. The cause of death was determined by such tests as the use of bacterial cultures from one 'coon and the inoculation of mice with the specimens.

Anthrax, Smith explained, was one of the great human plagues before serums were invented for its prevention. Known as "wool-sorters disease," it infected workers who gathered and sorted freshly sheared wool from sheep. A few years ago, several men contracted the disease from shaving brushes made of hog bristles from China.

Caused by a germ that lives from 20 to 30 years in the soil, the disease is hard to kill. Infected meat has to be cooked under steam pressure to be safe for consumption Smith said.

Smith said several cases of the malady have been discovered recently in cattle in the College Station vicinity.
