Draft Test Application Due Mar. 10

Brig. Gen. Paul L. Wakefield, state director of Selective Service, reminded male college students of draft age today that they must apply quickly if they wish to take the Selective Service college qualification test this spring.

Applications for the test, to be given on April 24, must be postmarked no later than midnight Monday, March 10. Applications postmarked after that time will not be accepted.

Any local board of the Selective Service System can furnish the student with a bulletin of information about the test, application blank, and envelope for mailing. Applications go to Educational Testing Service, Princeton, New Jersey.

To be able to take the test, an

• Must be a Selective Service registrant who intends to request occupational deferment as a student.

• Must be satisfactorily pursuing a full-time college course, undergraduate or graduate, leading to a degree. (The applicant need not be in a four-year college, but his entire course of study must be satisfactory for transfer of credits to a degree-granting institution.)

• Must not previously have taken the test.


