Kiwanis, BAFB Plan Kid's Day Program

The College Station Kiwanis Club, cooperating with Bryan Air Force Base, will sponsor a tour of the base Saturday, Sept. 27, for 500 boys and girls from the junior and senior high schools of College Station and Bryan.

The tour is a part of the National Kids' Day of Kiwanis International. The Air Force is cooperating nationally.

Seven buses will pick up 100 students at A&M Consolidated and 400 at Stephen F. Austin High School in Bryan at 8:30 a. m. Saturday. The open house will be from 9 a. m. until noon.

After a picture show and an orientation lecture, Air Force Cadets will act as guides for groups of 25 boys and girls to tour all departments of the base.

Each boy and girl will have an opportunity to examine the jet planes and have them explained. If time permits some of the students will be given a ride in the Link trainers.

The students will be served cold

drinks and ice cream supplied by the Dr. Pepper Bottling Company and Lily Ice Cream Company.

Col. James McGehee, wing commander of Bryan AFB, extended the invitation for the tour to the Kiwanis Club. Working on the program are Otis Miller, Kiwanis president; Ed Ivy, chairman of the Kiwanis Boys and Girls Committee; and Lt. W. M. Hodson, BAFB public information officer.

Also as a part of the National Kids Day, girls of the A&M Consolidated Future Homemakers Club will sell National Kids' Day buttons at 25 cents each. Half of the proceeds will go to the girls for selling the buttons, and the other half will be turned over to Dan Russell, for use in carrying on the next Crippled Childrens' Clinic in Brazos and 11 other counties.

Efforts by the art gallery committee and Mrs. Terry have not passed unrewarded. They receive their reward by the pleased looks on students' faces who attend and study the exhibits.

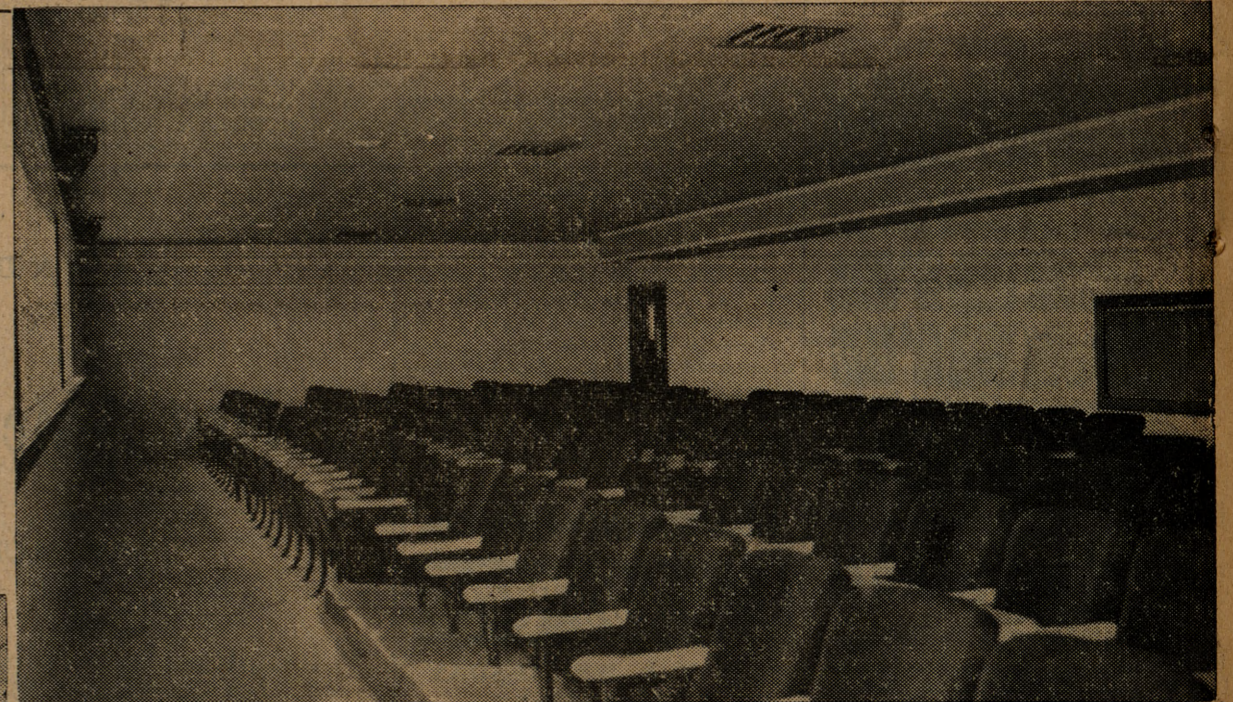
