

Graves Sparks Aggies To Beat Cougars 21-13

Ray Graves tied the bow on the surprise package to the University of Houston Cougars Saturday night.

Inside the package was a fired-up team of Aggies who knew who the game belonged to from the word go.

Graves ran wild. He displayed brilliant quarterbacking to keep the Cougars guessing.

He carried the ball, passed it, and handed it off on smoothly clicking ground plays. He leads the conference in total yards gained with 197.

Raymond Haas and Don Ellis, Aggie halfbacks, had their own little surprises.

Haas hit off tackles and around ends 64 yards and pulled down passes for some more gain.

Ellis set himself up as a double threat when he crossed the line for one touchdown and passed for another.

Hooper Greatly Improved

Big Darrow Hooper showed great improvement over last year as he snagged 3 passes for 31 yards and one touchdown.

The Olympic star was praised by Coach Ray George for his "returning to A&M as if he had been working in west Texas all summer rather than making a name for himself at Helsinki."

All-America Jack Little put in his usual great game at tackle. "Here's one boy who knows his job, does it well, and never complains about anything," said George.

Fullbacks Pound Line

Fullbacks Connie Magourik and Don Kachtik pounded the center of the line for the all-important first downs. Both these men bucked the very heart of the highly rated big Cougar line, and kept fans wondering how.

Guards Sid Theriot and Marvin Tate can take the credit for the holes in the center of the U of H forward wall.

These inexperienced sophomores were pitted against hardened veterans who outweighed the small guards almost 30 pounds per man. Before the game ended, the huge Cougar veterans were wondering where the hurricane came from.

Ends Darrow Hooper and Eric Miller weren't satisfied with merely catching passes for yard after yard, they had to harass the giant U of H tackles by blocking them out of play time after time. Hooper also converted three times in three tries for 1,000 per cent.

Ellis Passes

Ellis, on a pitch-out from Graves, passed to Hooper for eight yards into the end zone to give the Aggies their first tally.

Ellis crossed over from 11 yards out for the second score after Graves set things up with a pass, and the brilliant quarterback carried the ball across himself for the last touchdown.

Bobby Clatterbuck sparked the

Cougars with his passing and kept the Houston squad threatening every time they handled the ball. Fullback Paul Carr did the ground work for the Cougars, and proved to be as good as pre-game publicity. He rolled up 67 of the 135 yards made by his team on the ground.

U of H Couldn't Hold

The big U of H line was able to hold only at the tackle slots. The center of the line gave in time after time with Aggies Sid Theriot and Marvin Tate taking the credit.

Carr made the first Cougar score from one foot out. His smash topped an 80-yard drive in the third quarter. S. M. Meeks, tiny halfback, snatched a 27 yard throw from Clatterbuck in the same period for the second and last U of H touchdown.

Aggies Threaten

Three times during the game the Aggies were virtually knocking at the Cougar door, but couldn't cross the big double stripe.

Haas of the Aggies pulled a pass down just across the end zone about six feet. This was called back just as the would-be-touchdown jaunt of Ellis was returned because of an illegal receiver downfield.

Ellis fumbled the ball once just two yards away from the goal when three Cougar defensive men slammed him to the ground.

As the game ended the Maroon and White was once more threatening. The Aggies lined up over the ball on the eight yard line, but time ran out before the ball could be snapped.

Other Sports in October

Other sports will begin the first week of October. Class A (Seniors and Juniors) will begin by playing basketball, team tennis, and bowling.

Class B (Sophomores) will begin with football, horseshoes, and ping pong. Class C (Freshmen) opens with basketball, team tennis, and bowling. Class D (Non-Military) begins with basketball and team tennis.

Barney Welch, Intramural Ath-

letic Director, announced a few more Sophomore Intramural Managers are needed. He urged any interested Sophomores to come by the Intramural Office.

Eligibility in intramurals is governed by the Student Activities Handbook. In addition to staff and Senior Companies, a team may use not more than two men who are not bona-fide residents of that unit.

Points will be given in all classes. At the end of the year the team with the most points will be declared Intramural Champions in Class A and B, C, and D.

Graves Helps Aggies Lead SWC In Total Offense

Ray Graves, Aggie quarterback, is the total offense leader in the Southwest conference with 197 yards on 27 rushing and passing plays through the first week of play.

Graves also had the best percentage of completion of the SWC passers with a .642 on nine out of 14.

Dick Ochoa, the line-smashing Texas fullback has a slim lead in the ball-carrying department with 83 yards against the LSU Tigers.

Close behind Ochoa, is teammate Gib Dawson, a scat-back who rolled up 79 yards in the Longhorns' 35-14 victory. Pressing Ochoa and Dawson is Graves, who made 76 yards against the Houston Cougars, including a touchdown.

Aerial Department

In the aerial department, Lamar McHan, Arkansas ace, tops the list with 139 yards on 10 completions, but Cotton Davidson of Baylor has the best average per toss with six for 114 yards.

McHan is second to Graves in the total offense leadership with 154 yards on 34 plays.

Davidson paces the punters with a 43.5 average, and Bob Raley of Texas and Ray McKnown of TCU are tied for second with 39.3.

Pass Receivers

Arkansas' Ron Forrester jumped into the lead in the pass-receiving race making four catches for 74 yards. Bob Blair of TCU snagged three pitches for 70 yards and the runner-up spot.

The Aggies set the pace in the total team offense department, racking up 386 yards against the Cougars while Baylor takes over the second spot with 319 yards. The Bears lead in passing with 202 yards.

Plans to Enlarge Kyle Field Ready

Plans are now underway to expand the west side of Kyle Field to provide approximately 2,650 additional seats between the 30-yard lines, and an \$80,000 press box.

Athletic Director Bones Irwin announced this morning that options are being offered to former students on a first-come first-serve basis to finance the cost of erecting the additional seats. After November 1, 1952 the options will be offered to the general public.

Each twenty year option will cost \$50.00 and will entitle the purchasers to buy one ticket in the new addition to each home football game upon payment of the regular price of admission.

The options are transferrable and the number that can be purchased is unlimited. The options may also be purchased so that individual groups may sit together during all home games.

Each year a drawing will be held to determine option holder.

seating arrangements within the new addition for each home game.

Besides the addition of 2560 seats, a first class press box will be constructed on the west side of the stadium and will be financed completely from Athletic Department funds.

A brochure explaining the plans is being mailed out to the 27,000 former students.

Press Box Behind Addition

The proposed press box will be built up and behind the planned seating addition. Modeled after the press boxes at Baylor and Oklahoma University, the Aggie press box will be modern in every respect.

The press box will be 140 feet long and will furnish accommodations for 108 working newspaper men. An outside elevator will transport the news men to the box.
