Teacher's Chief Headache

The chief headache of teachers, Brooks said, is "testing and gradng." These are administrative duties salient to teaching.

"If teaching was more effective and students zealous to learn, the headache could be omitted. Circumstances force these upon us and disclose to the student what he has not learned and to the

teacher what must be retaught."

Brooks pointed out that to acquire good teacher and student reations, the instructor must find a formula to apply equally to all groups. "Nothing can cripple a student more than to think he has been terated unfairly," he added.
