Granted, you may have scratched your knee the other day, you must consider the more than 100,000 casualties in Korea before making such a statement.

Concerning the price of meals in the corps mess halls you said: "... we in the corps pay for part of our meals, that doesn't cover the entire amount spent by the college for food. The difference is made up by the government. The government is getting soldiers out of us, so it sees fit to feed us, but what will it be getting from the non-regs?"

Let me call to your attention that the mess halls receive no subsidies from any source, especially the U. S. Government. It is a self-

supporting non-profit part of the college.

In reply to your question, "What will it (the government) get out of the non-regs?" I can only say that if you had been at this school a little longer or knew a little more about A&M you would never ask such a question. There are many men in the non-regs who have already completed their military training here at A&M and will receive commissions in January or June '53.

Think of the Aggies here who have already seen more combat service than a lot of the Aggies now in school will see. Also there is a large percentage that will soon be in the Army and on the front lines, who will not be wearing the bars or enjoy the privileges you will get after graduation. How can you ask "What will it be getting from the non-regs?"

You said, "... where as college regulations prevent underclassmen from living off the campus, I don't believe there is anything about upperclassmen or non-regs rooming off the campus. If you don't like the campus as the rest of us seem to do why don't you try that?"

In only exceptionally special cases are men permitted to live off the campus unless they are married or are living with their parents. Crowded living conditions is not enough reason to obtain permission. You should take this matter up with Dean Morgan or Bennie Zinn if you are really concerned about it.

"Like the campus as the rest of us seem to do..." You know less about the school than the average sophomore to be voicing opinions and criticizing the non-regs.

Your lack of knowledge and complete invalidity of your letter can be overlooked to a very small extent when it is known you are a transfer or a so called "super-charged" junior, but still I must apologize to the readers of The Battalion for the misleading letter you wrote.
