Sparkman Asks **United Front**

Huntsville, Ala., Nov. 5 — Sen. John J. Sparkman of Al-abama, Democratic candidate for vice president, said early today, "The American people have spoken, and I concur fully in heir choice.

Sparkman issued his statement after Gov. Adlai Stevenson of Illi-nois, the party's presidential nom-inee, had conceded defeat of the Democratic slate.

"I have no regrets over the out-ome of this election," Sparkman aid. "The American people have spoken in and I concur fully in their choice. I believe in the neessity of presenting a united front and will do my best to co-operate with Gen. Eisenhower and his ad-ministration to fulfill the responsibilities facing the country."

Sparkman said he saw no "difficulty" as far as the Democratic party is concerned. He said it will be a party of "loyal opposition, but can be looked to to co-operate fully in any constructive program that is proposed."
