Decision: Disapproved. Suggestion 3: Juniors and Senors to authorize physical exercise and delegate authority. Decision: Disapproved. The

On Saturday, the flights will be made from 8 a. m. to noon. Four students will fly each day, with two of them reporting to Ross Hall no later than 12:45 p.m. and the other two no later than 2:45.

In each flight, the student will get basic instruction in planning the flight, routine inspection be-fore take off, how to wear and use the parachute, clearance, weather, and navigational aids He will get a chance to handle the controls in a few basic maneuvers.

Local flights scheduled for this program will not be made under bad weather conditions or after sundown. Students will be furnish ed transportation from Ross Hall to and from Bryan AFB.
