

# Texas Artists' Paintings Being Shown In MSC

The Contemporary Artists Collection is now being exhibited in the front display case in the MSC, said Mrs. Ralph Terry, sponsor of the MSC art gallery committee.

The 25 paintings being exhibited are a part of a large selection of paintings submitted by Texas artists to the Knoedler Gallery of New York City. From the numerous paintings received, The Knoedler Gallery selected 69 paintings which they are now exhibiting in various parts of the state, said Mrs. Terry.

The purpose of the exhibit is to provide regional exhibits for the Texas artists, she added.

From the collection which was recently exhibited at the Contemporary Museum in Houston, 25 paintings were selected to be displayed in the MSC showcase.

Several of the well known Texas artists whose paintings are represented in the collection include Otis Dozier of Dallas; E. M. (Buck) Schiewetz, former student of the college; Francis Skinner of Houston; and Janet Turner of Nacogdoches.

The exhibit will be displayed in the MSC until Nov. 4, and it will then be sent to Austin where the entire 69 paintings of the collection will be displayed in the capitol.

# Grievance Answers

After careful consideration of suggestions made to the Commandant by a Committee of Cadet Officers on Wednesday, the following decisions have been made:

I. A. Topic: Company Discipline.

Suggestion 1: Company Commanders to authorize close order drill at any time.

Decision: Extra drill for organizations not authorized. Cadets serving company punishment tours may be given close order drill, with or without arms, at the discretion of the Unit Commander between the hours of 1700 and 1800 hours.

Suggestion 2: Company commanders to authorize physical exercise.

Decision: Disapproved.

Suggestion 3: Juniors and Seniors to authorize physical exercise and delegate authority.

Decision: Disapproved. The types of disciplinary action suggested have been tried in the past and found to be unsatisfactory.

B. Topic: Company meetings.

Suggestion: Company commanders may at any time call company meetings.

Decision: Approved, providing meetings to be confined to period between Reveille and Taps.

II. Topic: Senior Companies.

Suggestion: Abolishment of Senior companies and return of men in them to original companies.

Decision: Disapproved. Status of fourth year and fifth year men not qualified for cadet rank being given further study.

III. Topic: Senior Uniform Regulations

Suggestion: Seniors to be allowed to wear civilian clothes after Retreat and on Saturday afternoons and Sundays.

Decision: Disapproved. Interpretation of military college uniform requirements requested of higher headquarters for possible reconsideration.

IV. Topic: Freshman Area

Suggestion 1: Freshman area to be opened to all upperclassmen

from 8 a. m. to 7 p. m. daily.

Decision: Disapproved.

Suggestion 2: Freshmen to be allowed to visit upperclassmen area by February 1953.

Decision: Disapproved.

Suggestion 3: Abolition of freshmen area by September 1953.

Decision: Disapproved.

V. Topic: Misinterpretation of privileges and traditions.

Suggestion: Traditions committee to coordinate with Office of the Commandant all standing and proposed privileges.

Decision: Commandant will consult with committee at any time to prevent conflicts with College Regulations.

VI. Topic: Letters of Complaint

Suggestion: All letters regarding his company or members thereof to be made known, with name of accuser, to company commander.

Decision: Company commanders will be informed of details of all letters of complaint concerning their companies, but no names will be given. Company commanders will be allowed to prepare statements to be forwarded with replies to such letters.

VII. Topic: Physical Inspections

Suggestion: Physical inspections as now conducted to be discontinued.

Decision: Disapproved. Physical inspections will be continued so long as there is evidence of hazing in the Corps of Cadets.

VIII. Topic: Reinstatement of B Armor.

Suggestion: Reorganize B Armor and reinstate Vic Gillette as C. O.

Decision: Disapproved.

IX. Topic "Fish" Day

Suggestion: Fish days on Oct. 31 and April 1 be officially designated, with freshmen being allowed upperclass privileges for the day.

Decision: Approved as presented by committee, with the understanding that no demonstrations or other violations of College Regulations will be allowed.

X. Topic: Midnight Yell Practice Off Campus.

Suggestion: Midnight Yell Practices off campus be allowed.

# Plane Flights For AFROTC Students Begin

An orientation flight program for AFROTC seniors began Monday afternoon, said Col. John A. Way, PAS&T.

The purpose of this program is help the student evaluate the basic principles involved in flying and help him decide whether or not he wants to make it his career, Col. Way said.

Aircraft utilized will be T-6s, T-11s, or C-45s, which can accommodate two students each. Flights will be made from 12:45 to 5 p. m. Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Friday.

On Saturday, the flights will be made from 8 a. m. to noon. Four students will fly each day, with two of them reporting to Ross Hall no later than 12:45 p. m. and the other two no later than 2:45.

In each flight, the student will get basic instruction in planning the flight, routine inspection before take off, how to wear and use the parachute, clearance, weather, and navigational aids. He will get a chance to handle the controls in a few basic maneuvers.

Local flights scheduled for this program will not be made under bad weather conditions or after sundown. Students will be furnished transportation from Ross Hall to and from Bryan AFB.

If time permits, juniors, sophomores, and freshmen will be included in the program.
