Student leaders and officials of the University of Texas will be here Thursday to officially invite our student body to Austin for Thanksgiving Day activities on Nov. 27.

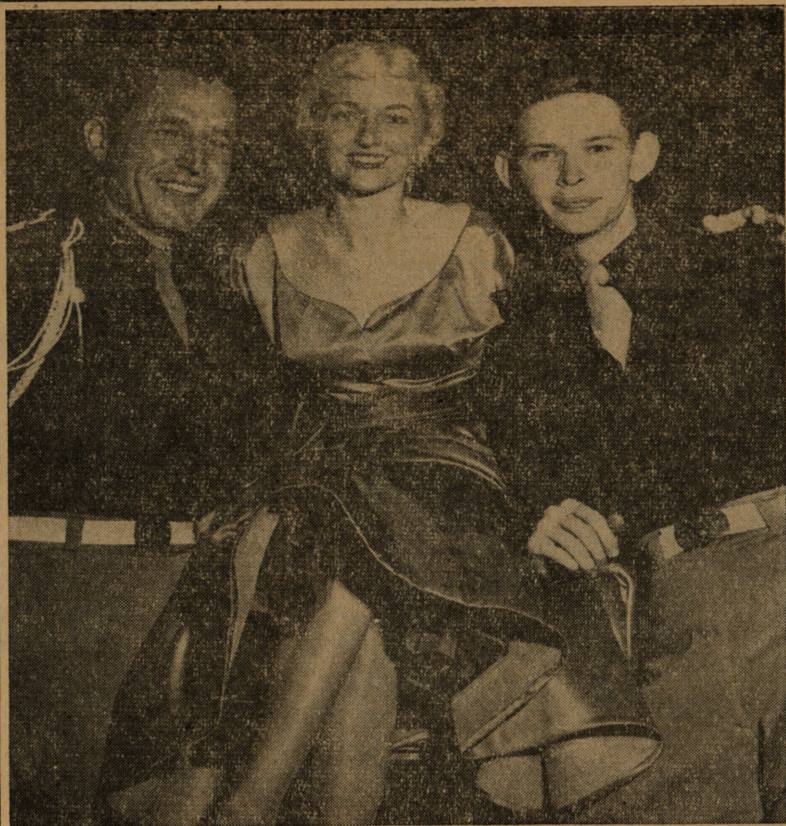

**EDITOR'S NOTE:** The college has not forgotten its primary purpose is to give an education, although many persons could easily get the idea that A&M's one and only purpose is only for producing officers. It is giving a good education, and like all institutions, could do a better job, and is still expanding its facilities. But to feel that one can have an educational institution without some form of discipline and enforcement of college regulations is absurd. The commandant is directly responsible to the dean of men for enforcing discipline in the Corps of Cadets and the military department assists the commandant who is also coordinator of the military science department.

Concerning the lowering of morals and morale, we doubt that physical inspections affect morals and morale more than the reason which makes these inspections necessary—use of the "board." The violation of human rights should be considered when one is forced to take the "board", since this also affects both students who are disobeying college regulations.

The operation of A&M is by the president through the men he has appointed to help him. Actually, the president of the college is responsible for everything a subordinate does.

## Army Pilots Exhibit Observation Skills

Senior cadets of the infantry, field artillery, antiaircraft, armor, signal corps, and transportation corps will attend an aircraft demonstration 3:15 p. m. Thursday, at Easterwood Airport.

Pilots of the First Armored Division Aviation Section, Ft. Hood, will give a ground demonstration of aircraft used by the Army. Following the demonstration, 15 cadets will make a short flight in the planes.

Four cadets each from infantry and field artillery, two from antiaircraft, armor and transportation and one from the signal corps will be allowed to make flights.

Senior instructors will designate the cadets in his branch who are to fly.

To be eligible for the army aviation program, a student must see

his instructor and sign up six months prior to his commissioning.

Those who apply must not be past 30, not weigh more than 180, not taller than six feet, and must meet physical standards for flight training.

A cadet applying for this program must sign a statement for three years service. He will take a physical at Ft. Hood at his own expense.

The Ft. Sill artillery school is conducting this course.

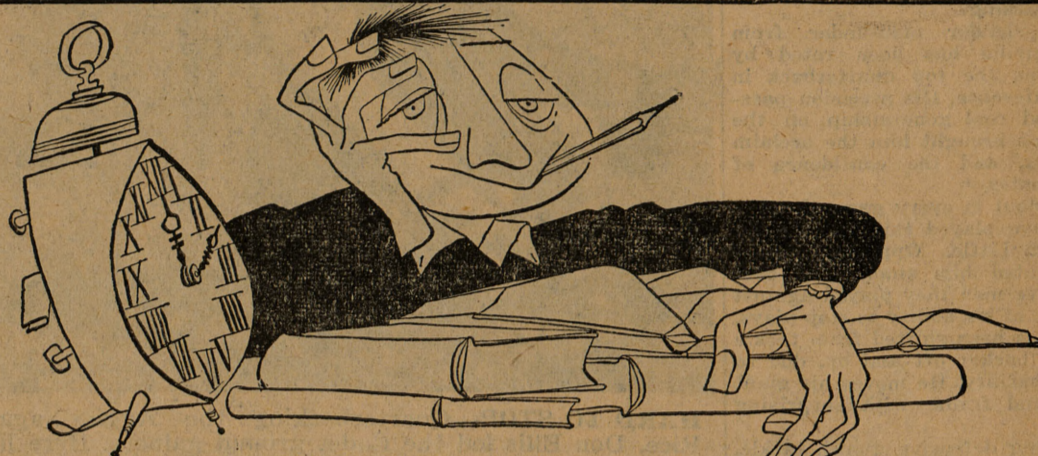
